**HORSE AND STOCK NEWS**

Powell & Currans, of Mercer county, received an order from D. Laine, of Havana, Cuba, for six fox hounds. Dr. Laine spent several days in Kentucky last spring and bought a saddle horse and several fox hounds.

In Pendleton county Tom Jacobs sold his farm five miles from Falmouth to Geo. Dougherty for \$70 per acre. Mr. Jacobs bought this farm 15 years ago for \$10 an acre, but sweet clover and alfalfa brought it back to its present value.

Ball Bros., of Versailles, who are now at Springfield, Ill., with their horses, have sold their beautiful saddle mare Mena for \$5,000. They are having great success on this trip, having taken every premium in the saddle horse class at the horse shows, both at Leroy, Ill., and Springfield.

In Scott county Mitchell Butler, a farmer, about 55 years old, was instantly killed at Hinton Station by Elmer Dunston, a negro, and the latter made his escape before the sheriffs could be summoned. Dunston is still at large.

Sam Burdette's mule sale in Columbia was a success. He sold twenty-eight in pairs and they brought from \$200 to \$382.50 a pair.

France, in her last war loan, raised \$5,000,000,000 without any public fuss. In proportion to her national wealth that means about as much as \$20,000,000,000 in this country. We modestly refrain from bragging about the last American loan.

The stable of W. L. champion roadster as yet undefeated.

News comes from Cincinnati now that plans are being discussed in Cincinnati to have the world series baseball games played at the Speedway at Sharonville, fifteen miles from Cincinnati, provided, the Cincinnati Nationals win the pennant. Within

a week or ten days, it is asserted, the proposition will be ready for submission to the board of directors of the Cincinnati baseball club. It is pointed out that the Speedway can easily be arranged to seat 100,000 persons.

**Kentuckian Sold Fine Timber**

T. J. McCloud, portrait of Paintsville, this state sold 3,360 acres of hardwood timber in Arkansas to a large furniture manufacturing establishment at Muskegon, Michigan, for \$80,000. This land was bought years ago by Mr. McCloud's father for 50 cents an acre, paying for same in Arkansas script. It was not possible to market the timber until a new railroad was built some two years ago that runs now within one half mile of the land.
