 Wednesday and is showing the way in
 this department with 31 thefts.

POSTMASTERSHIP AT RAVENNA IS VACANT

At the request of the Post-
 master General the United States
 Civil Service Commission has an-
 nounced an examination at Rich-
 mond on October 22 for the po-
 sition of postmaster at Ravenna.
 This office has an annual com-
 pensation of \$1000.

To be eligible for this exami-
 nation an applicant must be a
 citizen of the United States, must
 actually reside within the deli-
 very of the office and have so
 resided at the time the present
 vacancy occurred.

Applicants must have reached
 their twenty-first but not their
 sixty-seventh birthday on the
 examination.

Application Form 2241 and full
 information concerning the re-
 quirements of the examination
 may be secured from the post-
 master at the place of vacancy or
 from the Civil Service Commis-
 sion, Washington, D. C. Appli-
 cations should be properly exe-
 cuted and filed with Commission
 Washington, D. C. in time to ar-
 range for the examination of the
 applicant.
