Democrats and citizens generally were delighted with the speeches of Senator Beckham Hon. W. H. Shanks in closing the campaign Monday afternoon. But there are some compensating features of our frequent elections and one of the clearest of these is the opportunity they afford to develop new men.

Comparisons we know are often unwise, but the Evening Post thinks it no exaggeration to state that the best new man developed by either party in this year's campaign is Mr. W. H. Shanks, the Democratic nominee, for Lieutenant Governor. Mr. Shanks, of course, enjoyed the respect and esteem of the people of Central Kentucky before he entered the race for the nomination for Lieutenant Governor, but that race was first venture on a State-wide scale. He was new to many of the people of the State and he has made a fine impression, everywhere he has gone. He made a runaway race in the primary, and holds the second place on the Democratic ticket because the Democrats of the State selected him, and not because a small group of party bosses picked him out.

Mr. Shanks is well-equipped to make an excellent presiding officer of the State Senate and to administer the other duties incidental to the Lieutenant Governor's office. And he will make a good Governor whenever called upon to act as the State's chief executive in the absence of the Governor. Mr. Shanks should be elected by the same majority given to Governor Black.
