Two of the triplets born to Mrs. S. J. Smith, of Paducah, the boy and one of the girls died after living four days. There are also twins three years old in the Smith family.

A coroner's jury declared unjustifiable the killing of Floyd Payne by Dick Wood, another negro, 30 minutes after Payne had arrived from Florida to work on the Sims farm. They quarreled over a drink of water.


