Eccentricities of Genius.

Paul Verlaine, a modern French poet, was a genius whose life was passed in alternate stages of religious ecstasy and deplorable excesses. After 1870 he led the traditional bohemian life in Paris, then disappeared for eleven years. In 1881 he appeared in the public eye as a quasi-Catholic with his "Sageesse," perhaps his best-known work. From this time to his death in 1896 Verlaine remained, except for brief intervals, among the cafes of the Latin quarter, drinking absinthe, carousing and writing verse and journalistic articles.
