Miss Anna Lee Davis, Home Economics teacher of the Normal left today for a week-end visit to friends in Covington.


Dr. W. B. Campbell, of Kentucky Wesleyan College, Winchester, delivered the address to the Senior class at Waco High School Friday evening.


