MADISON COUNTY BLUE GRASS CROP

M. C. Covington, living south of the city on the Lancaster pike, as well as other raisers of bluegrass, rejoice over the fact that they have not had a more successful year's growth than the 1920 crop for a decade, and the quality of seed being gathered is out of the ordinary. Baldwin and Burke, who have an immense tract on Silver creek, are harvesting their grain, and the prediction is made that the product will bring \$1.75, and perhaps \$2 per bushel, allowing 14 pounds to the bushel. There is the usual demand for the Kentucky product. Thomas Curtis, another big Madison county producer, is of the opinion that the price will soar as it has not done for several years. The yield, he reports, is as good as will be found on the market. Louis Neal, living west of the city, is another whose opinion coincides with the others who reported on their crops. Some of the big producers will have thousands of bushels.
