200 MOONSHINE STILLS DESTROYED

Much "White Mule" Made, But Officers Are Jubilant Over Present Outlook

S. R. Brame, supervisor of national prohibition enforcement for the district comprising Kentucky, Virginia, Tennessee, North Carolina, and South Carolina, is highly pleased with the work of prohibition agents for the Eastern district of Kentucky, according to reports made at Covington headquarters.

He is so well pleased with the showing made by Mr. Williams and his ten raiders that he will not increase the force in Eastern Kentucky, he stated. Since the 18th amendment went into effect approximately 200 moonshine stills in Eastern Kentucky have been destroyed.

"There is more moonshining in Mr. Brame's district than in all the other forty-three states by far," Mr. Williams said today. "In Eastern Kentucky there is more making of whisky now than at any time in history for two reasons.

"First," said Mr. Williams, "within the last three years the price of whisky at the still has increased from \$3 to \$20 a gallon, and second, the general exhaustion of 'red' liquor has made the moonshine product more in demand. Most of the bootlegging is done in the mining regions, according to Mr. Williams. In those sections the population is largely made up of foreigners and the insufficient number of enforcement officers makes it possible to keep on duty there.

In the extreme eastern and southeastern parts of the state is where moonshining flourishes the chief prohibition officer said. In some places the selling of moonshine liquor is the only source of revenue the natives have as their land will not produce crops.

Attitude of the citizens in Breathitt county was shown recently when many of the residents assisted the officers in making raids.

R. W. COLYER MAKES RECORD WITH CHICKENS

R. W. Colyer, while not a noted fancier, in his own estimation, is making a record with a few hens in a lot on Water street that is attracting attention, while he is not catering to notoriety, admits having just sent a number of chickens to Mississippi, as well as a number of western and northern states, while he is shipping eggs in almost every direction. He boasts of two hens that have been laying faithfully for 2 years without any disposition to "set for awhile," and the number of eggs produced by sixteen hens is close to a record breaker.

Mr. Colyer is of the belief that more chickens raisers should pay special attention to a better breed of fowls, stating they are both more profitable and easily handled, than a miscellaneous flock. He has a great demand for eggs, he states, and would be able to dispose of thrice the number could he procure them.

Gets Letter From Son Reported Dead

W. T. Underwood, of Nicholasville, who received word from the Navy Department several months ago that his son, Hobart Underwood, had drowned off the coast of Ireland, has received a letter from his son, stating he is in Akron, O., where he has been since March, after his discharge from the army. The mistake of the Navy Department was due to the confusion of the name Hobart with Hubert Underwood. The dead man's home is not known.

NOTED EDUCATORS COMING TO RICHMOND

Special Features Provided For Summer Terms More Interesting Than Usual

The list of special features for each week of the summer term at Eastern Normal is proving most interesting this year, there being a greater diversion than usually presented.

While Health Week was important instructive, it will not be appreciated so much as the coming week, which is being given over to the Chautauqua.

This will present a list of unusual entertainments for students who will be able to witness such for the first time. The work of Prof. R. P. Green was greatly appreciated and following the Chautauqua, there will be a special state and city school representation, in the persons of several of leading educators of the state. There will be special lectures and talks daily. Prof. Bisley, superintendent of the Owensboro city schools, and president of the K. E. A., will be here for a week. He will deliver lectures during the morning and afternoon.

Following will be a visit of Miss Jessie Burrall, chief of staff in geography, of Washington, D. C., who will exhibit and explain new modes of work and acquaint teachers and students with the manner in which instructions are given in the greater cities. The lectures of Prof. Bisley will be very important to teachers in the city schools, especially since they will treat on the mode of teaching and issuing instructions generally.

The closing week of the summer school will record the coming to the city of a number of noted educators, among whom will be Prof. McHenry Rhodes, of the Kentucky State school system, Dr. F. C. Button, J. Virgil Chapman and others.

NATURE STUDY CLASS LARGELY ATTENDED

Inquiries directed to many adult persons who have lived here for years, relative to the nature, habits, and even the names of some of the beautiful birds to be seen about the city, is resultant in either an evasive answer, or one denoting but little knowledge of the feathered tribe. One man, who admitted to fifty years of life much of which was spent here and in the country, admitted that his ten year old son "could tell" about the birds, but personally, he admitted he had never had the opportunity—or time—to give the important matter more than a passing thought.

All of which brings about the fact that there are many students, members of the nature study class at Eastern Normal, who are up at 4 o'clock once a week, and out on the campus where they are receiving some interesting information regarding the common birds that are seen in and about their homes daily. This is one of the most interesting phases of the class, and is attended by more than 100 students regularly. Prof. G. D. Smith, at the head of this line of study, reported today that there was an increasing attendance. The class, comprising boys and girls, is preparing to hike to Boonesboro. The trip, which was postponed last week owing to the inclemency of the weather, will be made next Monday morning. The students will be taken in a body, and the small army will negotiate the trip by way of special route planned.
