BIG RETURNS FROM GRAIN OF MADISON

Farmers and Threshers Report High Prices Bring Good Average For Season

With the threshing of Madison county finished and the grain, in most part disposed of, and receipts counted up, it develops that the threatened short crop of wheat, which was especially reported in some localities, has been made good from a financial standpoint by the oats crop, the farmer and thrasher are not to come out behind.

For some time it was believed the year's returns would fall decidedly short in Madison county, but the figures of the threshers show, with the advanced price for the work, they have not toiled in vain, and the same can be said of the producers of the grain, since they have been and are receiving a greater price than usual for their product.

BOILER BLOWS UP; THREE MEN INJURED

Luxon Garage, On East Main, Scene of Serious Accident Late Tuesday Afternoon

Shortly before 5 o'clock Tuesday evening a boiler in the retreating department on the second floor at the Luxon garage, East Main street, let go, piercing the roof 12 feet above, shattering the rafters, and more or less seriously injuring three men, as follows:

W. E. Luxon, owner of the garage, blown 12 feet against a wall, seriously burned about the left side with steam burns extending from face to knee, also sustaining internal injuries by being struck by flying pieces of the boiler.

L. T. Robinson, head of the vulcanizing department, operating the boiler at the time, badly burned about the face and right shoulder and hurled against the wall, where he fell injured by the shock.

Thomas Stone, employe, third man in the boiler room at the time, slightly injured about the shoulders and arms by flying debris.

The extent of the internal injuries suffered by Mr. Luxon cannot be ascertained at this time by the attending physician, Dr. Jasper, who was immediately called, and who accompanied Mr. Luxon to his home, South Second street, where he was taken directly after the accident.

Robinson was able to be out Wednesday morning and explained that the boiler had not been working properly for some time and he was endeavoring to adjust it when the explosion came.

The boiler burst at the bottom. It was comparatively a new one, having been installed recently in this, a new department at the garage.

MADISON SCHOOLS PROVE INADEQUATE

Changes Necessary To Relieve Situation—Illustration Furnished At Bearwallow

GILBERT'S OFFICIAL PLURALITY IS 442

Complete Figures From All Counties Prove Him Victor Over Frank Ripy

(Wednesday's Courier-Journal) Official returns from all but Spencer county, in the Eighth district, show Judge Gilbert, Shelbyville, the democratic nominee for Congress, over Col. Frank Ripy, Lawrenceburg, by 442 majority. The Spencer vote is complete, but will not be officially tabulated until today.

John P. Haswell, Hardinsburg, was nominated as the republican candidate for Congress in the 4th district, and Omar W. Barber, Owingville, apparently has won in the Ninth district, according to practically complete official returns received by the Courier-Journal.

In the Fourth, Mr. Haswell's majority over Marshall Duncan, Springfield, is 462.

In the Ninth, Omar Barber is leading Dr. Yazell, Maysville, by 223, with no report from Wolfe county.

Henry Prewitt Wins

Judge Prewitt, Mt. Sterling, won the democratic nomination for Circuit Judge in the 21st district by 285 majority over his fellow townsman, J. G. Winn, according to official returns from Montgomery, Rowan and Menifee counties, and unofficial returns from Bath county, where the vote will not be canvassed until today.

PARTIAL RETURNS OF OHIO PRIMARY

(By Associated Press) Columbus, O., Aug. 11—Returns from two-thirds of the precincts in yesterday's primary show Harry L. Davis is leading former Congressman Cole for the republican nomination for Governor, by 19,000. For United States Senator former Gov. Willis had 30,000 more than Walter Brown.

On the democratic side, State Auditor Donahey is unopposed for Governor, and for United States Senator W. A. Julian led Judge O'Neil by only 2,000.

POLAND SEEKS AID OF UNITED STATES

(By Associated Press) Washington, Aug. 11—Poland will ask immediate aid of the United States in the fight against Russian Bolshevism, Polish Minister Ludomirski announced here today. He said the appeal would be based on the assurance contained in the American note to Italy that the United States will insist upon the maintenance of the political integrity of Poland.

Prohi. Party Active

(By Associated Press) Germantown, O., Aug. 11—Representatives of the Prohibition party from practically every part of the country, arrived here today for the formal notification of Dr. Aaron Watkins, the presidential nominee, and D. Leigh Colvin, his running mate, of their nomination. Members of the executive committee already here, include Mrs. Frances Beauchamp, of Lexington, Ky.
