### IN THE MOVIES

It was one of the most unaccountable tricks of fate that brought Nazimova, the great Russian actress who is now appearing in "Madame Peacock," from Rita Weiman's story, to this country, for the first time. She left Russia as leading woman in Paul Orloff's company to tour the continent in repertoire. Her most frequent appearances were in "L'Algon," "Zaza," "Camille," and several of Ibsen's plays.

The tour was a brilliant artistic success but a financial failure. So much so, in fact, that Ellen Terry and a company of influential actors and actresses in London organized a benefit for the relief of the Russian players. Orloff then brought his payers to his country in 1905 in the hope of recouping his losses. But the plays acted in the Russian language proved a failure.

Orloff returned to Russia but Nazimova remained, heeding the pleas of managers and critics who in the brief glimpses afforded them had realized her tremendous powers. "Madame Peacock" will be shown at the local theatres Tuesday.
