

HOW THEY WILL GO ON PRIMARY BALLOTS

Candidates All Draw Their Positions At County Clerk's Office Tuesday

Candidates in races where there are more than one seeking such office drew for their places on the county primary ballots Tuesday. The drawing was held at the office of County Clerk J. W. Maupin, who, under the law, has to make up the ballot ready for printing. There was much interest manifested in the drawing as many candidates consider it an advantage to have first place on ballot.

Where there is but one candidate for an office, his name does not have to appear on the ballot but he is awarded a certificate of nomination. The only contest among the republicans is for the nominations for justice of the peace in several districts, and for police judge of Berea. POWELL OUT OF TAX COMMISSIONER'S RACE

Tax Commissioner Ben R. Powell has withdrawn as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for re-election, his friends will be surprised to know. Mr. Powell made the announcement at the time for candidates to draw their positions on the ballot Tuesday. He says that his official duties have kept him so busy that he does not have the time to get out and see the voters. The withdrawal of Mr. Powell leaves Will W. Adams the sole candidate for the Democratic nomination, and he will get his commission now without a contest. In making announcement of his withdrawal, Mr. Powell says:

As I have not been able and will not be able because of official business to make a thorough canvass of the county, I deem it to my best interests to withdraw from the race for County Tax Commissioner. I want to thank my friends who have so faithfully stood by me for I deeply appreciate your kindness and hope that you will stand by the party as you have stood by me.

KILLING IN HAY FIELD IN GARRARD COUNTY

Lancaster, Ky., July 13—Brown Jasper, 26, of Jessamine county, was shot and killed Tuesday afternoon by Robert Lunsford, 34, while the two men were working alone in a hay field on the farm of Charles Deitrich in the northern part of the county. After the shooting Lunsford went to Bryantsville, informed relatives of his act, and gave himself up later to Sheriff Arch Walker, of Garrard county.

Lunsford said the trouble arose when Jasper accused him of being a thief, and threatened him with a pistol, claiming that he shot Jasper in self defense. Only one shot was fired, and that pierced the heart of the victim. Further than this Lunsford refuses to discuss the tragedy.

The only witness of the shooting was an 18-year-old son of Charles Deitrich, owner of the farm, who was in a nearby field. Young Deitrich said that he was so far away from the two men that he would make no statement concerning the shooting.

Jasper was single and lived with his widowed mother in Jessamine county. Lunsford is a farmer and lives in the northern part of Garrard county.

Lunsford was put under arrest by Sheriff Walker and brought to the Garrard county jail in Lancaster.

PISTOL SHOT BREAKS YOUNG NEGRO'S ARM

Charles Moren, a young negro, is at the Pattie A. Clay Infirmary with a badly shattered left arm just around below the shoulder. The bone was broken by a bullet from a revolver which Moren says was fired by Leonard Jackson, of the Lowell section, of Garrard county. Moren says he went to Jackson and asked him to pay him a small sum he owed him, whereupon the latter drew a pistol and shot him. Moren claims he took the gun away from Jackson after he was shot, and with one arm useless. Just what Jackson says of the shooting has not been learned here. If any arrest is made in the case it will probably come in Garrard county for the transaction is said to have taken place there. Moren says he has been working for Hugh Galey in the Kirksville section of this county. His arm was set by Dr. O. F. Hume and is in a plaster cast.

HERE'S PRIZE JOKE OF POLITICAL SEASON

Ex-Mayor Sam'l Rice Neglects to File Necessary Papers to Get On Primary Ballot

The prize joke of the present political campaign was pulled by former Mayor Sam'l Rice and he laughingly admits it.

Mr. Rice forgot to file his papers as a candidate for the democratic nomination for Mayor with in the prescribed time. In fact he never did file them. He went over to draw his place on the ballot along with the other candidates and their friends Tuesday and lo, and behold, he came to a realization of the fact that he had not filed the necessary papers, duly prepared and sworn to as required by law.

Mr. Rice is therefore not a candidate for Mayor of Richmond, which will be quite a disappointment to his many friends. He had already started a vigorous campaign and had announced a platform which set forth his view and his record of past service to the city and taxpayers. Mr. Rice took the matter in good spirit and told the other candidates to go to it, that they have his sympathy.

There are thus only four candidates in the race for Mayor—present Mayor L. P. Evans, Jeff D. Mitchell, Robert Golden and W. E. Blanton.

Mr. Rice has issued the following card to the public about the matter:

Through a misapprehension of the election law, I failed to file declaration papers in time with the County Clerk, and am therefore barred from being voted for in the primary August 5. I regret this mistake very much as I believe I stood a fair chance of winning the nomination. I thank my many friends most cordially for their loyal support, and trust that at some time in the future I may be of service to them.

Falmouth, Ky., July 13—While returning home from Covington where he and his family had been visiting his brother, James Higgins, 55, of Carlisle, was instantaneously killed in an automobile accident Tuesday near here. Higgins was accompanied by his wife and daughter, Ruby, 14. Mrs. Higgins probably was fatally injured, it is believed. The girl's injuries are not considered serious. The auto, driven by Higgins, collided, head on, with a county road construction motor water wagon, on a curve at the bottom of a hill.

PLEAS BENTON QUILTS COUNCILMANIC RACE

Although his friends expected him to run and make a splendid councilman, just as he has made a splendid magistrate, Pleas Benton decided at the last minute not to qualify as a candidate for the democratic nomination in his ward, due to the fact that his brother, Van Benton, is a candidate for Sheriff. He was afraid his candidacy might injure that of his brother. Mr. Benton had given assurance to a number of prominent business men who wanted to see some strong men on the ticket, that he would make the race and his withdrawal at the last moment came as quite a surprise and disappointment to them. His withdrawal leaves only three candidates in his ward, Wm. O'Neil, Bige McCowan and Charles M. Martin, for the democratic nomination. Ernest L. Parks is a republican candidate for councilman in this ward, too, the first republican candidate for councilman that has been seen in Richmond in a long while. There are four candidates each in the other two wards, only two of whom can be elected from each ward, for while the voters of the city vote for all of the councilmen two only can be chosen from each of the three wards.

ALL ALLIES BUT JAPS HAVE ACCEPTED

London, July 13—Three of the principal Allied nations, Great Britain, France, and Italy, have officially accepted President Harding's invitation to hold a disarmament conference.

China has indicated her readiness to confer on Far Eastern affairs. Japan is the only one of the Allies not yet on record as being ready to participate in a Washington conference. Japan is expected to accept. Opinion here is that the most prominent statesmen of the world will attend.

Officials are busy preparing for the Irish conference. The Premier conferred with advisors at his country home. De Valera conferred with Arthur Griffith and other Sinn Fein leaders. Meanwhile South and West Ireland is quiet. In the north, especially Belfast, there has been fighting between Sinn Feiners and Unionists. The outcome of the conference depends on what the British offer.

TO HELP STAMP OUT TYPHOID FEVER

Dr. Zeigler Makes Recommendations In Connection With Recent Epidemic In Lexington

Louisville, Ky., July 13—Every recommendation made by Dr. M. V. Zeigler in his report on the recent typhoid epidemic in Lexington can be carried out by county health officers, declared Dr. A. T. McCormack, state health officer, in making public today the recommendations of Dr. Zeigler, who was loaned to the State Board of Health by the U. S. Public Health Service, to investigate conditions in Lexington. Although the survey was limited to that city Dr. Zeigler framed his recommendations to include all cities in Kentucky.

"There are laws," Dr. McCormack said, "under which every one of the recommendations made by Dr. Zeigler could be carried out by the county health officers in the state, and the State Board of Health is urging every county health officer to see that these laws are enforced."

The recommendations, eleven in number, were:

"That all milk sold or offered for sale in the state be pasteurized by heating to a temperature of 145 degrees F. and held at that temperature for 30 minutes.

"That no milk bottle or milk container be removed from premises on which there is a known case of typhoid without authority from the county board of health and then only after compliance with the requirement for proper sterilization of such containers under direction of health authorities.

"That the State Board of Health provide a typhoid vaccine to all physicians free, and that county health boards provide facilities for administration of typhoid immunization to all persons applying therefor.

"That all persons in homes where typhoid or suspected cases exist avail themselves of typhoid prophylaxis, whether directly or indirectly exposed to a known case.

"That health departments furnish disinfecting agents for disinfecting excretion and discharge from typhoid or suspected cases free of charge in such cases as financial inability to purchase disinfectants is encountered.

"That no excreta be removed from rooms of patients suffering from typhoid fever without first being disinfected, particularly when such excreta ultimately is deposited in surface vaults.

"That sanitary sewers be extended to all districts that are supplied with city water, and that premises available to existing sewers be required to make connections.

"That all privy vaults be abolished where sewer connections are available.

"That sanitary privies, fly-proof, water-tight and ventilated, of a type approved by the State Board of Health, be installed in those sections of available to sanitary sewers.

"That an adequate sewerage system and inspection system be installed in those sections of cities not served by sanitary sewers.

"That daily bacteriological examination of all city water be made and that daily reports be made to the superintendent of the water works for his guidance in the chlorination processes."
