"Farmers of the Middle West are going bankrupt because they have no profitable market for their products," said former Senator William S. Kenyon in a speech to the students at Missouri University just before he took the oath of office as United States Circuit Judge. And if the farmers of the Middle West are curious to know what became of their profitable markets, they might consult Judge Kenyon's former colleague, Cabot Lodge.

It was the defeat of the treaty of Versailles by the Senate which struck the final blow to the already tottering system of European credit. The period of demoralization began then. Because of the disintegration of European credit the peoples of Europe are suffering for food

that the American farmer cannot sell at any price. While millions of Europeans verge on starvation, the Middle West is burning corn as a substitute for coal. Senator Lodge organized the conspiracy against the treaty, and the wreck of European credit is a direct result of his efforts. Senator Lodge is the man who ought to explain to the Middle West farmers what happened to their markets.

The Two New Normals

With the legislature having provided for the establishment of two additional normal schools the next question is their location. There really was never any need for more normals. Half the sum that are going to be required for the establishment and upkeep of the new schools, if devoted to Eastern and Western Normal would make their capacity sufficient to care for many years in the future. But the deed is done and two more are to be set a work. The commission on location should move carefully in the selection of their sites. They should not be placed close enough to either Richmond or Bowling Green to conflict with the two great institutions which are now doing such great work. The Courier-Journal had a sensible editorial on this subject the other day. It said:

There is an opportunity for the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House to do the state a good service in the appointment of the Commission, authorized by the legislature, to select sites for the two state normal schools. Naturally various influences will be heard in the different sites, and in order that selections may be impartially made, free from any suspicion of improper consideration, Messrs. Ballard and Thompson of course realize that exceptional circumspection should be exercised in naming the members of the Commission. As one of the schools is to be in the eastern part of the state and the other in the western, would not a prime requisite of a satisfactory Commission be that it be composed of men from neither sections but entirely from Central Kentucky? Chosen in this way, provided, of course, they be men of character and judgment, free from any selfish or political interests which may be affected in the selection of the sites and firm enough to ignore those who may have and seek to advance such interests, the Commission would be one to perform its important duties as they should be performed. For the assurance of such a result the Courier-Journal urgently refers this suggestion to Lieutenant Governor Ballard and Speaker Thompson.

Galloway Farmers Ship Eggs in Carload Lots

Murray, Ky., Mar. 17—Carload shipments of poultry and the hatching of eggs are among the outstanding things that mark development in the poultry raising carried on by farmers in this section of the state, county agent J. B. Gardner has reported. The Galloway County Poultry Association, composed of 103 members and the local farmers' organization recently shipped a second car of poultry at an estimated saving to the farmers of the county of \$1,500, while other cars will be shipped in the near future. Members of the county association who are co-operating in the standardization campaign being conducted over the state by the College of Agriculture extension division already have distributed more than 200 settings of purchased hatching eggs to other farmers who will standardize their flocks.


