## LYLOYD GEORGE SAYS PEOPLE OR PARTY

(By Associated Press) London, Oct. 21—David Lloyd George, retiring Prime Minister, speaking at a great meeting of Coalitionists here today declared "the banner of party strife" has been hoisted at the recent meeting of the Conservatives which voted against continuing the coalition. "It is for the people of this country," he exclaimed "to decide whether the party comes first or the nation first. I stand for the people."

Those who expected a sensational announcement from the retiring Premier were disappointed. There was no suggestion of forming a new party. He asserted the Treaty of Versailles has become the charter of human liberty to tens of millions of people today. Its first clauses established the League of Nations, which he termed a great human charter that will be attained more and more as the years go by.
