The Cumberland College football squad arrived here Friday afternoon from Williamsburg. They are all set to meet Eastern Normal on the local gridiron here Saturday afternoon. Coach Hembree held a valuable rehearsal Thursday afternoon which will be his last hard work-out before the game. A light drill was held Friday afternoon. The Williamsburg crowd is striving hard to capture this game. They lost to the visitors last year and hope to get revenge for this defeat. At the practice Thursday it was announced that John Jayne, local boy and regular line-man, will be unable to take part in the game. He is suffering from an injured shoulder which has been giving him considerable trouble of late. His absence will be missed considerably as he has been a power in the Eastern games previous to this game. He will be replaced by Baker, a red-headed youth of great promise. The backfield has received some polishing in the last few days. Talton Stone will fall signals, while Powell will start at fullback. Moberly and Hurst are slated for the halfbacks. These men have been put through some very hard drills so that the offense will be a strong as possible. In the line Covington and Word will hold down the ends, Baker and Lewis the tackles, and Triplett and Spencer the guards. Shelby Carr is down for center. Coach Jones, of Cumberland, has much the same team that he used last year. They are well trained and will fight their hardest against the Maroon and White. The Eastern students will hold a "pep" rally Friday night on the campus. A bon fire will be built. Gathered around it the students will practice their yells and songs for the game Saturday. Miss Carolyn Rice of this city, is the girl cheer leader at Eastern and with her assistants she is expected to have pep that unequalled at Eastern in previous years.
