## INDORSED BY THE CENTRAL LABOR UNION.

That the Kentucky Irish American is steadily growing in favor with its readers and usefulness to the public is evidenced by the action of the Central Labor Union at a recent meeting in giving this paper its indorsement, which is the more welcome and appreciated because unsolicited and unexpected. The publisher is grateful, and will endeavor to merit this additional recognition. Our friends will be pleased to learn that the proposition favoring the indorsement was unanimously adopted by the delegates of both bodies. The preamble and resolutions adopted by the Central Labor Union are as follows:

Whereas, Many misstatements have recently appeared in the press of this city relative to the Central Labor Union and organizations represented therein; and Whereas, The Kentucky Irish American has always been a consistent and unbiased champion of the trades union movement; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Central Labor Union indorse said Kentucky Irish American as the official newspaper of this body.

Resolved, That the proceedings of this organization and all affiliated unions be communicated to the public through the columns of the aforesaid paper.

### IRELAND.

#### Record of the Most Important of the Recent Events Culled From Exchanges.

A branch of the United Irish League has been formed in Listry Cross, Kerry. The movement for the preservation of the Irish language has taken a firm foothold in Keady.

Terence Glancy has resigned his position as Secretary of the Roscommon County Council.

Alexander Patterson was accidentally drowned at the West Bridge, Enniskillen, a short time ago.

A flourishing branch of the United Irish League has been organized at Castlerea, County Roscommon.

Edward O'Connor, a venerable resident of Bolabeg, Brannoxtown, died recently. He was seventy-three years old.

J. T. Heffernan, of Kildare, ex-Chairman of the District Council, was chosen Secretary of the County Council.

The death occurred recently in the Infirmary, Trim, of John Teeling, after a short illness. He was sixty-two years of age.

G. Hagans, of Drumkeerin, Chairman of the Leitrim Rural District Council, has resigned that position. He is a sterling Nationalist.

At Killarney Petty Sessions there were no criminal cases for disposal, and Judge Shaw was presented with the customary white gloves.

Sligo Nationalists were coerced by their Unionist employers into signing a bogus address to be presented to the Queen on behalf of the "Citizens of Sligo."

The Newbridge branch of the Galway United Irish League has chosen Rev. Father O'Keefe for President, H. Crowe for Treasurer and Michael Dillon for Secretary.

The town of Carlingford has lost one of its oldest Catholic residents by the death of Mrs. Mary McCann, widow of the late Joseph McCann, of Dundalk. She was eighty-six years old.

The death occurred at Ballyhaunts, County Mayo, of Mrs. Margaret Fitzmaurice, wife of John C. Fitzmaurice, and sister of the Rev. Francis McDermott, curate of Hollymount.

The patriarch of the townland of Lisnasrehog, near Garvagh, was Bernard McNicholl. He was found dead in his bed recently. His age was ninety. His mother lived to be 107 years old.

The people of the districts which constitute the area under the control of the North Longford Executive of the United Irish League are nobly supporting the Irish cause. They recently subscribed \$100 to the fund.

James McLoughlin, aged fifty-five, a native of Blessington, County Wicklow, while driving cattle to the fair at Carlow, took suddenly ill at Greenlane bridge and died before aid arrived. The sum of \$230 was found in his pocket.

There died recently in Cardiff, Wales, Patrick Hayes, a native of Dreenagh, who was said to have had vivid remembrance of the landing of the French in Bantry bay in 1798. Hayes, whose age was given at 108, was a devout Catholic.

At the last meeting of the North Westmeath Executive Committee of the United Irish League there was a good attendance. John O'Sullivan was elected Chairman and Thomas Meehan was chosen for representative on the directory.

The Meelin Branch of the United Irish League has lost a sturdy member by the death of J. J. O'Connor, who was also a member of the District Council. He was a staunch Nationalist, and suffered two terms of imprisonment during the Balfour coercion regime.

Much regret is felt in Waterford at the death of Dr. W. R. Connolly, a member of a well-known and highly respected local family. Dr. Connolly, who held several public appointments, was an especial favorite with the poor of his native city, in whose behalf he was always kindly exerting himself.

The death recently of Father Thomas Feehan, of Castletown, Queen's county, was very deeply and widely regretted, after thirty years of missionary labors. His many fine qualities—religious and otherwise—had endeared him to priests and people. Few preachers could excel him in oratory and fervor.

At Newrath, a mile from Waterford, the wife of a farmer, named Eliza Keavns, was burned to death. A spark from the chimney ignited the house. The flames spread to the cow-shed, with the result that four cows, a rick of hay and the house were burned. In the effort to save the cattle Mrs. Keavns perished. There were interred in the family


