I was thrilled with joy when these pious pilgrims, our priests, our people from New York and elsewhere, unfurled two beautiful American flags in full view of the 50,000 people who had come to seek the blessing of Pius X. HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Bean soup is much improved by adding a little mace just before serving. When a teaspoonful of baking powder is called for in the rule it means a level measurement. Add a little vinegar to the water in which the fish is cooked and the flesh will be finer and whiter. To the "left-over" cabbage that was stewed in milk try adding a beaten egg and baking till brown. A little white sugar in the water in which green vegetables are boiled will preserve their color and is better than the use of soda. Remember that when fat bubbles it is only just melting and not at all in the right condition for frying. After the bubbling has subsided a slight smoke will arise and that is the moment the material should be put in. Ink stains are entirely removed by the immediate application of dry salt before the ink has dried. When the salt becomes discolored by absorbing the ink brush it off and apply more; wet slightly. Continue until the ink has disappeared. When a boot pinches wrap a cloth out of hot water and lay it over the part of the boot which is too tight. Keep the boot on till the leather is sufficiently stretched, which will not be a lengthy process, as the moist heat makes it give readily. Salt thrown on coals when broiling steak will prevent blazing from the dripping fat. When contents of pot or pan boil over or are spilled throw on salt on oil. It will prevent a disagreeable odor, and the stove or range may be more readily cleaned. To renovate crape lay it on a table and cover it with a damp cloth. Then pass a hot iron over the cloth as closely as you can without touching it. This treatment will freshen up the crape most beautifully, for the steam will cause it to wrinkle just as it does when new. Many eminent bacteriologists call attention to the power of fruit juices to kill disease germs. Lemon juice and apple juice are especially mentioned, the one containing citric acid and the other malic acid. Cholera germs are killed in fifteen minutes by either and typhoid germs in half an hour. If a lemon be squeezed into a glass of water containing cholera germs the water may be drunk with perfect safety if allowed to stand for fifteen or twenty minutes. A fruit diet will cleanse the stomach and alimentary canal and drive off many of the germs that cause disease.

HOSPITAL STEWARD.

John M. Hennessy, one of the hardest workers in the Democratic party and a well known resident of the East End, has been appointed Steward of the City Hospital, to succeed P. H. Duffy, resigned. Mr. Hennessy is a popular Irish-American and his appointment reflects credit on the judgment of the Board of Public Safety.

TRINITY COUNCIL.

Only routine business was transacted by Trinity Council last Monday night. Several reports were read and approved by committees arranging for the reception and entertainment of delegates to the Grand Council. Trinity's boys are taking a comparative rest during the summer, but will get down to hard work with the approach of fall.
