Record of the Most Important of the Recent Events Culled From Exchanges.

The Irish Ladies' Choir, which made such a successful tour of the United States, has arrived in Dublin.

The British Government will be asked to give the \$30,000 necessary for the Waterford Central School Equipment.

The Ulster Council has selected Gweedore as the site for the proposed Ulster College for the training of Gaelic teachers.

The new diocesan college at Letterkenny is rapidly nearing completion and will be opened for students in September.

The Very Rev. Canon Hayes, Administrator of the diocese of Killarney, has been appointed on the Asylum Committee by the County Council.

The Kerry Council has fixed a standard for water in butter of from 16 to 18 per cent. for creamery or factory butter and 20 per cent. for salt butter.

The Countess of Aberdeen opened the annual exhibition and sale of work in connection with the Limerick Branch of the Irish Industrial Association.

At a quarterly meeting of the Limerick branch of the Gaelic League the question of the language test in filling a vacancy for an engineer in the gas works was discussed.
