POPE PIUS X.

Declines to Accept Star of
Ethiopia From King of
Abyssinia.

The Pope has ordered his Secretary of State to send an official letter to King Menelik of Abyssinia thanking him for the honor conferred on His Holiness of the Star of Ethiopia, and declining the same on the ground that it is against the custom of foreign rulers. With the token, which was recently brought to Rome by Father Marie Bernhardt, a French missionary in Abyssinia, the Pope was presented with an autograph letter from the Abyssinian King, written in the Amharic language, together with a French translation, the work of the Apostolic Prefect, Mgr. Jarossien. The letter, which is an answer to a missive from the Vatican asking the Negus to protect the Catholic missions in his empire, is written on parchment and beautifully ornamented.

Announcement comes from Rome that the seventh Cardinal to be created at the consistory to be held will be Mgr. Aguirrey Garcia, Bishop of Burgos, Spain. The selection of the Bishop was decided upon in view of his meritorious career. He was to have been created a Cardinal at a later consistory, but the Vatican authorities, considering the festivities which are to follow the birth of a child to the royal family of Spain, thought it best to include him in the Cardinals to be created at the consistory of April 15. It was also marked at the Vatican that Spain had the right, through custom, to four Cardinals, while now only the Archbishops of Toledo, Barcelona, and Compostella belong to the Sacred College. With 18,000,000 Catholics, Spain has one-tenth of the members of the present Sacred College.
