### SEEING EUROPE.

Henry Kraft and Wife Are Impressed With Catholic Countries.

Letters received this week from Henry Kraft and wife, who are making an extended tour through Europe, bring news that they are enjoying perfect health and are frequently meeting Americans. The Eternal City, they say, made a lasting impression upon them, and the scenery throughout Italy was most beautiful, the vineyards appearing as though draped from tree to tree. Mr. and Mrs. Kraft arrived in Venice in time for the summer night celebration, which was most glorious and almost beyond description. With the bands, fireworks, illuminations and decorations and the thousands riding in gondolas—all on the water—the scenes were such as must be seen to be realized.

Florence was reached on a feast day, as was Boston in the Alps, and the religious celebrations were of such a pious and holy character that they will never be forgotten. Especially striking was the procession witnessed in the Alps, where first came a hundred priests and acolytes, then the boys and girls dressed in white, and followed in reverent manner by the entire populace. The religious fervor exhibited was a revelation to all from this country. Their trip will take them next to Berlin and Germany, where quite a stay will be made.

### GRATIFICATION

Felt at the Vatican Over Decoration of Russian Catholics.

Much gratification was reported felt at the Vatican when it was learned that the Czar had invested the Archbishop of Warsaw, Mr. Poppel, with the order of St. Alexander Newsky and that he had presented another Vatican favorite, Mr. Erdmann, of Mohilew, with a magnificent gold ring in recognition of their services in connection with the settlement of the Polish religious question.

There is no doubt entertained at the Vatican that the Russian Emperor has been personally much gratified at the efforts made by the Vatican authorities to keep the Polish Catholics in line in the Russian provinces, so as to prevent any effective disloyal manifestation against the Russian Government. It is hoped to obtain further facilities for the Church in the dominions of the Czar in the near future, especially since the recent death of the President of the Orthodox Synod, M. Pobiedonokoff. What is considered most important at the Vatican in connection with the Church in Russia is the establishment of a Catholic Hierarchy with well-defined dioceses, because up to now the Church there has been administered through Apostolic Vicars without a well-defined jurisdiction.

### WHITE CITY FEATURES.

Four free shows in the park, besides two free daily concerts by Cora Youngblood Corson's band of thirty-five women, are the side attractions which the White City offers for the coming week. The price of admission to the Fire Show, the biggest, spectacular feature of the White City, has been reduced from twenty-five to fifteen cents, and the Figure 8 will in the future be operated for five cents a trip. The skating rink reduced its price of admission to fifteen cents last week, and in addition to this, inaugurated a popularity contest, which is proving a hit with the skaters of the city.

The management announces that arrangements have been made with the various concessionaires to throw open their doors, free of charge, to the patrons of the park in the event of rain. There are seven acres of shelter at the White City, and under these conditions no one need stay away for fear of getting drenched.

Negotiations have almost been completed for the biograph films of the Oberammergau Passion Play, and it is expected that the management will be enabled to put them on week after next. This will be the

### SILLY STORY.

Concerning Paper Proving Claim Made by French Pretenders.

The Osservatore Romano, the official organ of the Holy See, has answered the claims recently made by several of the French newspapers to the effect that the Pope and his predecessors of the last century have made many efforts to support the claim of the Nauendorf descendants to the throne of France. The Nauendorfs pretend that the founder of their family was the Dauphin, son of the unfortunate King Louis XVI, who according to chronicles of the time was gradually killed through ill-treatment by the shoemaker Simon, to whom the child was given in charge. The Nauendorfs and their friends claim that the Dauphin succeeded in escaping, and settled in Belgium, where he lived quietly until his death, pursuing the trade of a watchmaker. It has been their persistent claim for several years that in the Vatican archives there exists a letter written by the first Nauendorf to Pope Gregory XVI, in which he revealed his identity, but such a letter has never been discovered. The Osservatore Romano claims that the only such document in the Vatican archives is a brief denouncing the elder Nauendorf as an impostor.

### FONTAINE FERRY.

A number of good things are promised visitors to Fontaine Ferry next week. Aside from the regular weekly free fireworks exhibited on Saturday there will be many other popular attractions provided that will be absolutely free to the "Ferry" patrons. 
