

## HIBERNIANS.

What They Have Been Doing  
 the Past Week—General  
 News Notes.

Division 4's meeting Monday night will be the only meeting next week. During the past week Connecticut has increased its membership over 600.

A fine new division and an auxiliary have been instituted at St. Peter, Minn.

Many members hope the County Board will repeat the field day this summer.

Division 3 of Auburn, N. Y., has organized a Ladies' Auxiliary with thirty charter members.

The division initiation under the new ritual is providing very pleasing and satisfactory to the members.

The eulchre of the Ladies' Auxiliary was well attended and very enjoyable. All were delighted with the prizes they received.

It is reported that the uniforms of the Hibernian Rifles of Baltimore are the handsomest of any military organization in Maryland.

The time is growing short for the date of the national convention, and it behooves the marching clubs to keep up their good work.

Division 1 is making rapid progress since moving to Falls City Hall. New members are being enrolled and the treasury substantially enriched.

National, State and county officers will be present at the dedication of the handsome new Hibernian building just erected at Salem, Mass.

Every Hibernian in the city should attend the next meeting of Division 1 to hear Thomas Shelley relate the story of Fenian invasion of Canada.

National President Cummings forwarded a check for \$1,000 to County President John Dillon for relief of the Chelsea fire victims who are members of the order.

Reports from thirty-two States and provinces show a net increase in membership for the past year of 4,500. The seventeen States not yet heard from will bring the number up to 6,000.

Division 10 of Clinton, Mass., is well fixed, having a treasury of over \$10,000 in gold, hard cash. The membership is 350. Division 19 of Waltham can count \$8,000 and Division 3 of Randolph \$6,000.

Six thousand members of the order were in the monster centenary parade that was reviewed by Cardinal Logue last Saturday in New York City. The order made a fine showing and was complimented by the Irish Primate.

For the erection of the Hibernian Temple at Roxbury, Mass., a snug sum of money is already in the treasury, and next Monday night a grand bazaar for its benefit will open with a monster parade of all the divisions in that district.

## MILITARY ESCORT

Will Convey Orphans to  
 Church of St. Vincent  
 de Paul.

Tomorrow will be held the annual celebration of the children of St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum, and the happy little ones will be conveyed from the asylum to St. Boniface's church, at Jackson and Green streets, where they will be met by the Uniform Rank, Catholic Knights of America and the several commanderies of the Knights of St. John. With the military escort the vans containing the orphans will proceed to Shelby and Oak streets, where solemn vespers will be sung by the Rev. Father Thome. The officers and members of the St. Joseph's Asylum Society will join with the military on its march to St. Vincent de Paul's. With the orphans, the military and the members of the asylum society the church will be well filled. What room is left will be allotted to the members of the parish and their friends. An appropriate sermon will be preached before benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

For many years the orphans have made these annual pilgrimages to one of the German Catholic churches and later in the year they hold a gala feast at the asylum, when all their friends and benefactors are welcomed and entertained. The parade will form at 1:30 o'clock and will pass St. John's, St. Martin's and other churches on the route of march.

YOUNG DEMOCRATIC WORKERS.

The Louisville Tammany Club, composed of some of the best known young Democrats in the city, effected a temporary organization at Sixth and Breckinridge streets last Saturday night. William P. McDonogh was elected temporary President and William J. Connelly temporary Secretary. The club has a membership of forty to start with and expects to increase the number to 1,000 within a few weeks.

MILITARY EULCHRE.

A military eulchre, dance and drill will be held at Phoenix Hill Park on the night of Tuesday, June 9, under the auspices of the two companies of the Uniform Rank, G. K. of A. An excellent band will furnish the music. Leafy June, spirited music, the gold lace of the officers and natty uniforms of the subalterns and privates will all conduce to bring young men and maids out in large numbers.

## KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS.

Late News That Will Interest Members Here and Elsewhere.

At the latest meeting of Utica Council eight applications for membership were filed.

A new council has been organized at Longmont, Col., with a charter membership of seventy-six.

The fourth will be conferred at Des Moines on May 31. Candidates will be present from Iowa, South Dakota and Nebraska.

Louisiana has another council that gives much promise. It was instituted at Crowley when the three degrees were conferred upon thirty candidates.

The Indiana State Council will be held at Washington next Tuesday. Great preparations have been made for the entertainment of delegates and the lecture of Rev. Father Vaughan at the Opera House.

Bunker Hill Council of Boston realized a substantial sum from a sacred concert given for the relief of their Chelsea brethren, more than 100 of whom lost their possessions in the disastrous fire that almost wiped out that city.

JOINS ANGELIC BAND.

Mary Winifred, the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dan J. Hennessy, died Thursday evening at the family residence, 1126 Hepburn avenue, and widespread sympathy is felt for the bereaved parents. The little child contracted a cold two weeks ago, and the complications that followed caused death. Funeral services took place yesterday afternoon, when the body was tenderly laid to rest in St. Louis Cemetery.

## IRELAND.

Record of the Most Important of the Recent Events Culled From Exchanges.

A branch of the Town Tenants' League has been established at Carrick-on-Shannon.

Judge Barry received white gloves at the Carlow quarter sessions, there being no criminal cases.

Michael J. Horan, of Birr, has been appointed to the commission of the Peace for King's county.

Carrickmacross had a phenomenal visit of wintry weather and a heavy fall of snow the last week in April.

John O'Brien has consented to represent the Ballytrain electoral division again and will have no opposition.

Rev. James Quigley, of Ennscothy, has been appointed to Castlebridge, in succession of the late Canon Cloney.

Ardee mourns the death of Bernard Duffy, former head of the Royal Irish Constabulary. He was sixty-seven years old.

The damage done by the fire that broke out in Fernoy and almost wiped out Queen's Square is estimated at \$125,000.

Much regret is felt on all sides in the Ballytrain district at the retirement of Thomas Mohan from the County and District Councils.

Justice Patrick McQuaid was the unanimous choice for the County Council of the convention held to select a candidate for the Shercock district.

The new branch railway from Strabane to Letterkenny, running through a busy and prosperous section of County Donegal is now completely and ready for traffic.

It was with feelings of deep regret that news was received throughout the county of the death of Thomas Comiskey, leader of the Irish League brass band at Bailieborough, after a brief illness.

Rose Henry, aged fifty and the wife of a respectable farm laborer, while engaged in doing some work in the garden where she was employed at Magheraclone took suddenly ill and expired before her presence was missed.

The death of Patrick O'Neill, of Mooncoin, County Kilkenny, is widely regretted. For forty years he was the village schoolmaster, and many of the priests and professional men of Ossory received the rudiments of their education in his school.

While returning from the Cavan fair to Lisnashanna two farmers named Joseph Ebbitt and Joseph Mulligan had a dispute and in the scuffle that ensued the latter had some ribs broken. For a time Mulligan's life was thought to be in great danger.

James McEntaggart, a well known resident of Dundalk, was among those who passed away the latter part of April, leaving many sorrowing friends and relatives. Rev. Father McDonnell officiated at the funeral and interment at Castletown cemetery.

A regrettable accident occurred at the Greenore golf links by which a popular caddy merchant, George Alderdiel, received serious injury to one of his eyes. The eye was completely burst and the victim rendered unconscious. After the eye had been dressed the unfortunate man was removed to Belfast for treatment.

## GOOD FIELD.

Typographers Union Name  
 Able Men For Their  
 Candidates.

Louisville Typographical Union No. 10 will hold its annual election May 20. Nominations were made last Sunday and the members have an excellent field from which to choose officers and representatives. W. H. Stanley and Byron L. Butler are the opposing candidates for the Presidency. Mr. Stanley has been President several years and has previously been elected without opposition, and has always made a good officer. J. P. Stack is the only nominee for Vice President.

Other candidates nominated are: Recording Secretary, J. G. Kestler; Secretary and Treasurer, Max Traut and H. H. Griffin; Sergeant-at-Arms, J. E. Roberts. The five delegates to the Louisville Federation of Labor will be elected from the following nominations: H. A. Meckback, E. L. Cronk, J. H. Watson, J. O. Ames, W. R. Hickman, S. V. Hinkle and W. J. Jenner. George D. Frishe was nominated for the Auditing Committee without opposition.

Three delegates to the Allied Trades Printing Council will be elected from the following: Max Traut, D. D. Herrington, H. R. Coleman, A. F. McCarthy, Lee Hulett and Robert Trick. J. G. Kestler and J. H. Watson were nominated as delegates to the Woman's International Labor League.

W. R. Hickman, W. H. Dierkes and Thomas P. Watson were nominated for delegates to the International Typographical Union, two to be elected. John A. O'Connor, Robert Trick and John Hall were nominated as alternates. At the election to be held May 20 a vote will also be taken for the election of the officers of the International Union. It is a foregone conclusion that No. 10 will give its indorsements to President Lynch and Secretary Bramwood.
