HOPEFUL OUTLOOK.

The latest information from Niagara Falls, where the peace negotiations are under way, tells that terms for composing all international differences between the United States and Mexico have been concluded. The conditions under which diplomatic relations will be resumed were Wednesday night embodied in a protocol which was signed by the Ambassador from Brazil, the Ministers of Chile and Argentina and the American and Hueria delegates. The results of the mediators' work places the issue now squarely before the representatives of the two warring factions. On them will rest the responsibility for failure or success of the peace plans as a whole. The mediators and American delegates will stand by to give their counsel when sought.

BISHOP MULDOON'S ADVICE.

In an address to the Knights of Columbus at Quincy, Ill., Bishop Muldoon, of Rockford, made an eloquent plea for the Catholic press. "The Catholic Knight who is only a reader of the official organ is, I say without fear of contradiction, unworthy of the name he bears," said the Bishop. "You must be subscribers for Catholic journals. This means sacrifice, but sacrifice is part of the Knight's life. From time to time we hear Catholic editors saying that at our conventions we resolve, but do nothing practical. Let us remove this reproach by assisting and aiding in every way possible the local Catholic journals. They report our conventions, chronicle the events of the order throughout the year and speak in the highest terms of our work. Why should not we then, in gratitude, add them in their effort? Bishop Muldoon's words apply as well to other Catholic societies, numbers of whom seek the Catholic press only when they want free writeups and advertisement.

A. P. A. LECTURER.

To those wanting A. P. A. literature we recommended Edward Hughes, the C. & O. railroad conductor, in our last issue, he always finding time, as it is supposed with his employers' permission, to furnish his passengers with the Menace, Peril, etc. Now we have a local lecturer along the same lines in one Burrell C. ENGLISH FEELING.

The London Saturday Review, mouthpiece of most things anti-American, declares as absurd the proposal that has been made to place a statue of Abraham Lincoln near the statue of Canning at Westminster and hopes it will not be carried through. This is evidence of the feeling England has for the United States and should open the eyes of the misguided hundred years' peace advocates. The Review thus rebukes those favoring the proposition: "The idea is to commemorate the hundred years' peace between Britain and the United States, but Lincoln had nothing to do with either war of 1812-14 or the peace. The spot where the banal Canning statue stands is considered sacred to great British parliamentarians; Abraham Lincoln was not even a British subject. We have often criticized the United States and its people, but we would not murder Lincoln again, as it were, in stone." A statue in London would not honor either Lincoln or this country.

EXEMPTION SUSTAINED.

The International Harvester Company of America asked the United States Supreme Court to annul a decision of the Missouri State Supreme Court, which held that the Harvester Company violated the anti-trust law of that State. The contested point was that the law in question "arbitrarily discriminates between persons making or selling products and commodities and persons selling labor and service of all kinds." The United States Supreme

Court sustained the Missouri law and held that legislation had the right to make distinctions between organizations for trade and organizations of workers. This decision is of far-reaching importance to the trade union movement in its campaign for exemption from trust classification; it silences the claims of those who hold that if Congress passes the Clayton anti-trust bill with its labor exemption clause, which recently passed the House by an unanimous vote, such legislation will tend to be "class legislation." The decision is of peculiar interest in that the opinion was agreed to by the entire bench.

Kentucky has enacted a eugenic law, and this in spite of a wealth of glorious traditions anent the perfection of her human breed. Of all the States she should be the last to do such a thing. There must be some mistake.—Providence Visitor.

Very Rev. Father T. S. McGovern, who has been prior of St. Louis Bertrand's church for the past three years, and whose term has just expired, left Monday on his vacation, leaving here for Memphis, then going to New Orleans and from there by boat to New York, where his relatives reside. In his three years' pastorate Father McGovern did excellent work in wiping out the long standing church debt, the debt three years ago in round numbers being \$27,000. Last Sunday Father McGovern announced that the present debt was \$4,500 and that, including last Sunday's collection, he would have \$4,900 to pay this off and leave the church free from any encumbrance whatever. April 17 was the anniversary of Father McGovern's twenty-five years' ordination, and he was given a purse of \$1,000 for his present vacation as a token of the esteem in which he was held by his parishioners, and they are earnestly hoping that he will be chosen for another term at that church.
