HIBERNIANS.

What They Have Been Doing the Past Week—General News Notes.

Division 3 will meet Monday and Division 2 on Wednesday. Hibernians will be among the leaders at the St. Patrick's church celebration on Tuesday at Syracuse.

Robert Emmet Division of Baltimore has been receiving large numbers of applications at recent meetings. The Emerald Hibernian Social Club are pleased with the result of their moonlight excursion on Thursday night.

The Hibernians of Fall River, Mass., are moving toward the consolidation of the various divisions throughout the city. Many divisions and auxiliaries will celebrate the 140th anniversary of Daniel O'Connell, Ireland's great emancipator, on August 5.

United into one division the Hibernians of Manchester, N. H., have \$8,000 in the treasury and property valued at over \$20,000. National President McLaughlin will be the principal speaker at the Irish day celebration of the Cincinnati Hibernians on August 15.

Buffalo's big athletic event of the year, the field day and games of the united divisions of Erie county, will be observed at Columbus Park on August 25. Ladies' Auxiliary 1 of Minneapolis had a happy celebration of its twenty-first anniversary Monday night, a number of the charter members being present.

While entertaining their members at a party the Ladies' Auxiliary of Olean, N. Y., was presented with a complete set of banquet dishes, the gift of Division 1 of that city. Success crowned the field day of the Hibernians of Utica, when scholarly addresses were delivered by Mayor Smith, ex-Senator Davenport and Attorney William Dowling.

Councilman Tom Dolan and Charles Finegan, of Division 1, and M. J. McDermott and T. J. Garvey, of Division 4, will be nominated without opposition in the primary next Saturday. The Buffalo Hibernian Band is having its celebration today at Columbus Park. A hurling match between Buffalo and Syracuse, and a Gaelic football game are scheduled to be followed by an Irish concert when the sun goes down.

Overcome by Heat. Edward Fitzpatrick, the well known newspaper man, who was reported seriously ill at his home in New Albany, was able to be out within a day after he was stricken with a fainting spell which lasted only a few minutes. The intense heat, not apoplexy, caused his illness.

Visited New Albany. The Rev. Aloysius M. Gerdes, pastor of St. John's church, Middletown, Ohio, left the first of the week to visit relatives at Evansville, after a pleasant visit to the family of Mrs. Louise Armbruster, 312 West Spring street, New Albany. Father Gerdes was accompanied by his sister, Miss Mary Gerdes, who had been visiting Mrs. Armbruster and Mrs. Pauline Weckman.

Victim of Flames. While burning weeds at her home, 187 Coral avenue, Wednesday morning, Mrs. Owen McCann became enveloped in the flames and narrowly escaped a terrible death. Her face and body was badly burned and her rescue was due to the timely arrival of neighbors. Although in a serious condition on Thursday there was hope for her recovery.

Count Boni Loses. The Apostle Segnatura has rejected the appeal of Count Boni de Castellane in the Castellane-Gould marriage case, which had been disposed of by the Court of the Sacred Rota. His appeal was founded on an alleged misinterpretation of decrees of the Congregation of the Holy Office, but the Segnatura held that the judgment of the Rota, declaring that the marriage was a completely valid one, was a sound exposition of the fundamental doctrine concerning matrimony, which the church has continuously held since the earliest times. This ends the case, which attracted world-wide attention, and again the foes of Catholic marriage are doomed to disappointment.

Buried in Dublin. Requiem high mass, attended by a large congregation, was celebrated in St. Patrick's Cathedral in Dublin on Wednesday over the body of Jeremiah O'Donovan Rossa, the Irish patriot, who died on Staten Island, June 29. After the ceremony the body was removed to the City Hall, where it laid in state before burial in Patriot's Corner, in the Dublin suburb of Glasnevin. Mrs. O'Donovan Rossa and her daughter Eileen were among the mourners at the Cathedral.

Ovation for Bonzano. Five thousand Catholics gathered at the Union Station in Denver on Thursday morning of last week to greet His Excellency Most Rev. John Bonzano, Papal Delegate to the United States, on his way to Seattle to attend the national convention of the Knights of Columbus. He arrived over the Union Pacific and was escorted to the residence of Bishop Mate by the Knights of Columbus, Knights of St. John and Ancient Order of Hibernians.

AMERICAN CHRONOLOGY.

Timely Record of Some Memorable Events in the Catholic History of America.

By James A. Rooney, LL. D. August 1, 1865—Parish of St. Mary Star of the Sea, Bayonne, N. J., established by the Right Rev. James Roosevelt Bayley, with the Rev. Peter P. Niederhauser as first rector; golden jubilee celebration this year under direction of the Rev. Andrew M. Egan, the present pastor.

August 2, 1781—Death of Father John Claude Mathivet, Sulpician, missionary among the Iroquois and Algonquins and for twenty years Superior of the seminary at Lake of the Two Mountains, Oka, Canada.

August 3, 1905—Death at Barcelona, Spain, on the thirty-second birthday of his consecration of the Right Rev. Francis Mora, fourth Bishop of Monterey and Los Angeles; native of Spain, came to America with Bishop Amat in 1855; consecrated his Coadjutor August 3, 1873; succeeded to the see May 12, 1878.

August 4, 1907—Cornerstone laid of new Jesuit church of St. Joseph, Mobile, Ala.; dedicated May 24, 1908; old church dedicated August 15, 1858, previous to which the old church of St. John was used exclusively by Catholic Germans.

August 5, 1910—Death of the Right Rev. Edward Joseph Dunne, second Bishop of Dallas, Texas; born in Tipperary, April 23, 1848; ordained in Baltimore June 29, 1871; consecrated in Chicago November 30, 1893.

August 6, 1845—First meeting of the incorporators of the Brooklyn Benevolent Society, Bishop John Hughes presiding and T. C. Talmadge, Mayor of Brooklyn, present; officers elected: Bishop Hughes, President; W. H. Peck, Secretary; Patrick Haltigan, Agent.

PEWEE VALLEY. The members of St. Aloysius congregation, Pewee Valley, are making unusual preparation for the all-day picnic and celebration for the benefit of their church, to be held August 11. There will be many entertaining features, handsome awards and a big country dinner. Father Edward Boes, the pastor, invites his city friends to spend the day in the country. The picnic will be given on the church grounds, where the interurban cars stop.

FONTAINE FERRY. Singer's Midgets next week play their first engagement at the Fontaine Ferry Park Theater. This will be the third week these abbreviated little people have played the Ferry Theater this season, and on this return they are said to present an entirely new programme of feature acts and diversions. Ford and Chester will offer their novel singing and talking skit, "The English Johnnie and the Manicure Girl," while Izetta, a clever little woman, will entertain with the playing of the piano accordion.

ARCHBISHOP INSTALLED. The Most Rev. Archbishop Edward J. Hanna was formally installed in his see on Wednesday. The Apostolic Delegate, Most Rev. John Bonzano, arrived in San Francisco the first of the week and officiated at the installation which took place in St. Mary's Cathedral after the solemn Pontifical mass.

NAME DAY OF POPE. Sunday was the name day of Pope Benedict. His Holiness on Saturday received the member of the Sacred College, when the usual good wishes of the prelates were extended. Cardinal Vanutelli, dean of the Sacred College, pronounced a discourse, which was replied to by the Pontiff. The Pope spoke of the war, but in view of the privacy of the meeting the text of his remarks was not made public.

DRAMATIC SCENE. One of the most dramatic scenes in the Eastland tragedy took place when Father David McDonald, Father Francis O'Brien and Father Joseph Phelan, of the Holy Cross Cathedral, who had rushed to the Clark street bridge by automobile, made their way out upon the overturned boat and administered the last rites of the church to the injured and the dying in the boat and the waters about it. The rain and the river waters, which had made the boards slippery, made the feat particularly perilous.

ANOTHER BISHOP PASSES. Right Rev. Frederick Linneborn, Bishop of Dacca, East Bengal, India, died on Wednesday last of heart failure, according to a cablegram received at Notre Dame University, where Bishop Linneborn was formerly Rector of Holy Cross Seminary, he being a member of the Congregation of the Holy Cross, which conducts the University of Notre Dame. No details of his death are known. The message was sent by Rev. Timothy Crowley, C. S. C., and reads: "Bishop Linneborn died today. Heart failure." Bishop Linneborn is well known and fondly remembered at Notre Dame, where he had charge of the seminary for church students until succeeded by Father Cavanaugh, now President of the university, in 1898. He then became Procurator General of the Congregation of the Holy Cross with headquarters in Rome, and he also taught theology in the Holy City. He was a great favorite of Cardinal Gotti, at whose instance he was named Bishop of Dacca.

NOVEMBER JUBILEE. The golden jubilee of Sts. Peter and Paul's Cathedral in Philadelphia and of the ordination of Archbishop Prendergast will be celebrated on November 17.
