**CASE AGAINST FIELDS.**  
Four Times Has Judge Combs Alleged Slayed Been Called to Trial—Jury Impaneled.  
BARBOURVILLE, Ky., July 8.—The case against Jesse Fields for the alleged murder of Judge Combs in Perry county was called for the fourth time Monday, and a jury was impaneled Thursday. Judge Brown, of London, is the special judge. Judge S. R. Dishman, acting commonwealth attorney, Capt. Golden is conducting the defense. No new evidence is expected. Fields expresses much confidence in a favorable verdict. Over 200 witnesses and the friends of the parties concerned are here, but no trouble is expected.
