#### City Council Organizes.

The new City Council met in regular session Monday night. After reading minutes of previous meeting, the election of officers was gone into. W. O. Rigney was unanimously re-elected as treasurer, as was also Wm. H. Wherritt as clerk. Nominations for marshal were called for and Jas. R. Pearce was put before the meeting. Mr. Pearce received all the votes, and was sworn in. The place of attorney was next to be filled, and W. I. Williams and R. H. Tomlinson were nominated. Ballots were furnished the members, and the mayor read four for Williams and two for Tomlinson. A few minutes after, Joe E. Robinson arose and said that there were three members intending to vote for Tomlinson, and they wanted to go on record that way. Mayor Kinnaird said he was satisfied the ballots read as he had called them. It was then agreed to take an open vote, which was done and resulted in a tie. Mr. Kinnaird said that as he was a brother-in-law of Mr. Tomlinson, he declined to cast the deciding vote. Before the second vote was taken, Mr. Williams entered a protest to the taking of it. The mayor declined again to cast the vote and the meeting adjourned subject to call. The mayor appointed the following committees to serve the ensuing year: On Finance, Stormes and Higginbotham; on Charities, Robinson and Beazley; on Streets, Hamilton and Bengt. The vote for attorney was as follows: For Williams, Hamilton, Stormes and Higginbotham, for Tomlinson, Robinson, Bengt and Beazley.
