NEWS OF THE RAILWAYS.

Rock Island Announces Special Excursion Rates.
The Rock Island's proposition for cheap rate excursions to and from Colorado during this summer has been negatively by the Western Passenger Association. In consequence notice was served yesterday on Chairman McLeod by General Passenger Agent Sebastian, that the Rock Island will take independent action and put in effect a rate of one fare plus \$2.00 for the round trip from Chicago and all intermediate points east of the Missouri River to Denver, Colorado Springs, Pueblo, Salt Lake City and Ogden. Tickets at this rate will be sold on June 20, July 9 and 17 and August 1. From Missouri River points the same rate will be made on the days following these dates. Tickets at this rate also will be sold from Missouri River gateways, Kansas City to Omaha, inclusive, on July 7, 8 and 9th. Four special excursions also will be run by the Rock Island from Colorado common points to Chicago and intermediate stations on June 23, July 15 and 20 and August 4. These excursion tickets, both east and west bound, will be limited for return passage to October 31. The Rock Island announces its intention of placing in service special trains for these excursions, leaving Chicago at 5 p. m. and making the run to Colorado with only one night on the road—Chicago Tribune.

G. A. R. Encampment.
The Eighteenth Annual Encampment of the Department of Kentucky, Grand Army of the Republic, will be held in the beautiful city of Lancaster, Garrard county, Ky., May 24 and 25, 1900. The encampment will be opened for business Thursday morning, May 24, at 10 a. m. The Louisville & Nashville railroad and all other lines in this State have agreed to furnish trip tickets from all stations in Kentucky to Lancaster at one fare on account of the State Encampment, G. A. R. From near points tickets will be sold May 23 and 24, and from more distant points May 22 and 23. Final limit May 28. The Department Headquarters will be at the Garrard Hotel, room 17, and the Council of Administration is hereby called to meet at the above headquarters the evening of the 23d, at 8 p. m., to examine the accounts of Assistant Adjutants and Quartermaster Generals. The Encampment will be held in Lancaster Opera House, and the rules governing the National Encampment will be followed as nearly as possible in governing this Encampment. James E. Mullen is hereby appointed Officer of the Day for the holding of the Encampment. The Committee have secured rates at the Garrard Hotel at \$1 per day all Grand Army Comrades. We are assured that the Lancaster Comrades and the good people will bid us welcome and do all they can to make our stay with them pleasant. Let there be a full attendance of each post delegation, and every Comrade that can possibly do so should come and bring his wife.
We will be pleased to see a large delegation and attendance of the members of the W. R. C. and Ladies of the G. A. R., and will cheerfully render them any aid and assistance within our power. Let the Sons of Veterans come and they will be welcome, thrice welcome! at Department Headquarters.

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
