Operators in the Laurel county coal fields have agreed to raise wages seven cents on the ton.

By the closing down of 250 coke ovens at Stonega, Va., 500 men are thrown out of employment.

Robert Clemens, a wealthy young man of Fayette, committed suicide by shooting. He had been drinking.

Drouth is prevalent over a large portion of the State of Kansas and the corn crop is likely to be the smallest for several years.

Richard Mansfield White, explorer and mine owner, in an interview at Skagway, contends that the Klondike is in American territory.

H. M. Williams, of Rockcastle county, was nominated for Congress on the seventh ballot by the Eighth district Republican convention at Richmond Monday.

The license of the American Union Life Insurance Co. to do business in Kentucky has been revoked by the Deputy Insurance Commissioner.

Mrs. Charles Roberts formerly Miss Jones, of Louisville, is reported missing in China. She is believed to have been captured by the Boxers, and grave fears are entertained for her safety.

The official statistics of the wheat crops of the world for 1899-1900 have just been compiled by the Department of Agriculture. They show that in the countries of the Southern Hemisphere, whose wheat crops are commonly included in statements of the world's wheat crops, the production will hardly fall less than 160,543,000 bushels. This is 10,000,000 bushels short of last year's production. Australia and Chili are the only countries showing any material reductions.

A remarkable story comes to us of a year's work done by a couple of Bloomfield township children. Notwithstanding the fact that he is an invalid, T. J. Duncan rented 190 acres of what ground last fall, and his children, a girl 16 years of age and a boy 15 years of age, plowed the ground with riding plows, the girl harrowed it and the boy followed with a drill. A man was hired to run the harrower, the children doing most of the balance of the work. The threshing was completed last week and the 190 acres yielded 4,000 bushels of 61-pound wheat. Beloit (Kan.) In response to a number of requests this section of the dog law is published: Chapter 5, Article III, Section 68. —Every person owning, having or keeping any dog shall be liable to the party injured, for any damage done by such dog; but no recovery shall be had in case the person injured is, at the time, upon the premises of the owner of the dog, after night, or engaged in some unlawful act in the day time; and it shall be lawful for any person to kill, or cause to be killed, any dog which he may find roaming at large on his premises without the presence of the owner or keeper of such dog, and to kill or cause to be killed, any dog which may be or may have been found killing, worrying or injuring any stock outside of the inclosures of the owner of the dog.

Stanford Journal:—The biggest sale of real estate that has been made in Lincoln county for sometime was that of W. H. and John S. Murphy, executors of their father, Squire John S. Murphy, which took place in front of the court-house, beginning at 1 p. m., Wednesday. The splendid farm of 260 acres on the Hustonville pike was bought by W. H. Murphy at \$59.10; John Murphy got the 40 acre pasture in the suburbs of town at \$60.20 and W. H. Murphy the store room occupied by Warren & Shanks for \$3,820; the old Christian church and lot on depot street went to T. M. Goodknight for \$1,110, as did the Monroe Smith tract of 400 acres of knob land on Green river at 75c; of the 300 acres of knob land near Halls Gap Mr. Goodknight got 100 acres at \$1.05 and W. H. Murphy the remainder at 25c. The prices were all satisfactory and the sale amounted to about \$25,000.
