

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# GENERAL NEWS.

Of the 110,000 American soldiers who participated in the Mexican war only about 5,000 are living.

Judge Cantrill will try Jim Howard.

Admiral Dewey will spend the winter in Florida.

Peter Cooper Hewitt has invented a new light, which may revolutionize illuminating methods.

At Bethany, Conn., Edmund Peck, a retired Methodist clergyman, aged eighty years, and his daughter, thirty-five years, were burned to death.

The infant child of Orville Pollock, in Bourbon county, died as a result of a brass rivet lodging in his throat.

The five-year-old child of Lee Bowman was fatally burned at Pineville.

Burgin is to have a new tobacco manufactory.

An oil well will be sunk in Mercer county on a farm where oil was struck some years ago.

The properties and concessions of the Panama Canal Company were formally offered to the United States for \$40,000,000.

President McHenry has named a special committee to represent the Kentucky Press Association in matters legislative at Frankfort this winter.

Robbers at Bethany, Ill., got away with \$2,000 stolen from a bank. They had a battle with citizens.

Mrs. R. Light, wife of a life convict, filed suit at Washington, Ind., for \$2,000 damages against the saloon-keeper who, it is alleged, sold her husband the whisky which caused him to commit the crime for which he is in prison.

Nearly \$350,000 was spent in new building and improvements at Lexington in 1901.

A young man and woman were married while standing on top of the tower of the courthouse in Evansville.

Rear Admiral Sampson is failing both physically and mentally, and the end is now regarded as near. He is said to be intractable.

The monthly report of the United States Treasury Department shows a slight increase in receipts and a big decrease in expenditures for December, 1901, compared with the same month in 1900. A big reduction in the expenses of the War Department and a slight increase in the expenses of the Navy Department are also shown.

The public debt was reduced more than \$8,000,000 last month.

Gen. Gordon has issued the official order for the Confederate reunion at Dallas, Texas, April 23 to 25.

A. J. Hawes was fined \$2,000 by County Judge Spalding at Morganfield for aiding William Feeney, a negro union miner, to evade arrest. He has appealed the case.

Through the influence of Representative Gilbert the closing of traffic on the Kentucky river for the locks and dams has been postponed till late in the summer season.

Copies of a remarkable proclamation that is being circulated in the Philippines have been received at Washington. It is signed by nine Americans, seven of them claiming to be in the United States military service, and it invites American soldiers to desert and join the Filipinos.

In the figures now presented by the New York Journal of Commerce, showing the total capitalization of all industrial consolidations in the United States to approximate 6,500,000,000, there is found additional reason for insistence upon publicity of trust affairs for the protection of inventors and the general public.

The United States are reasonably well supplied with railroad lines, but during 1901 there were constructed 5,957 miles of additional track. This exceeds the net mileage of any year 1890. In Georgia, New Mexico and Texas the new track laid in each State was more than 200 miles. In Oklahoma 422 miles were built. Pennsylvania exceeded any other State in the number of roads projected or extended. There were 33 lines, with 153 miles of new track.
