### Land, Stock, Crops.

Never buy a horse of a warm personal friend. You will make a poor bargain and lose your friend.

Among the best investments a sheep breeder can make is the buying of a dipping tank and a few gallons or cases of dip.

Play shy of a sheep that "wobbles" as he walks; he has been overfed and is nothing less than a foundered and useless animal.

Poultry should have access to green food if possible, and when they cannot, should be furnished with cabbage leaves or a vegetable of some kind.

To keep the sheep in good condition they should be fed some kind of juicy food. Chopped potatoes are excellent.

The oat crop of Oklahoma will be the largest ever yet harvested. Seventy-five to one hundred bushels to the acre is the yield indicated in some of the newer portions of the territory.

A dealer in wild animals in Hamburg collected and sold last year 76 lions, tigers and panthers, 52 elephants 61 camels and dromedaries, 230 monkeys and a large number of smaller animals and birds.

The large breeders of Jersey cattle have started a movement to put an entry fee of \$25 to the A. J. C. on imported Jerseys, and Mr. L. S. Hardin, of Kentucky, says their motive is that they are loaded with Jerseys. Is it over-production or under-production of the breed?

Dirt roads are worse than for many years and good roads are being talked of by our leading citizens. Many attempts have been made to improve roads, but the only way to have good winter roads here is to pave.

Much interest is being taken in the breeding of fine stock by many of our leading farmers, and we hope in a few years to be up with the foremost countries of the State in this respect.

The indications are that the crop of bluegrass seed will be very short this year. Pastures that have not been grazed will produce only about half a crop, while those that have been grazed will produce much less. The seed has headed out low, but there is not much undergrowth to interfere with gathering.

Mrs Emma Simpson, near Hodgenville, has on hand over 400 chickens fattening for the market. She has sold \$65 worth this spring, and on one time sold thirty fliers at 30c a piece, or nine dollars for the lot. Mrs Simpson depends on incubators for hatching the chickens and next year expects to go into the chicken business on a large scale, saying that it has proved a good investment.—La Rue County Herald.

Some claim that a horse can be raised as cheaply as a steer. A calf needs some good grain the first winter. The same is true of the colt or filly. After the first winter the young of the horse kind will get along on good hay just as well as will the young of the cow kind; and then the 4-year-old is worth more than is the 4-year-old steer thus raised. The reference is to stock well bred and not scrub.

W M Robb bought Monday of Jas. A Hulet, of Jessamine county, 26 1,400 lb. export cattle at \$4.65 immediate delivery.

Messrs Charlton Alexander and W O Butler have disposed of their crop of hemp to H C Morgan, of Lexington for \$5.60 per 112 pounds.—Paris Kentuckian.

A herd of 150 bulls in one lot were sold at Harrodsburg to James Wheeler & Co., of Baltimore at \$4.50 per cwt. They were fattened at the Jno. B Thompson distillery.

A strawberry farm comprising more than 400 varieties growing on a plot of ground an acre in extent, is a proposed exhibit for the Horticulture Department at the World's Fair.

One hundred and twenty-five thousand square yards of sod have been laid in the preparation of World's fair lawns. In addition, 72 acres have been seeded to blue grass by the Landscape Department.

The unfavorable season has greatly injured the growing hemp crop and prices are going skyward. Will Marshall, of A von, sold his crop of hemp recently to Hamilton Scott, of Lexington, for \$5.75 per 112 pounds.

Boyle is one of the biggest hemp-growing counties in the State, and owing to the continued drouth, the hemp crop will be very light this fall. Boyle county farmers have already during the season delivered to the local hemp merchants more than five million pounds of hemp, or something over \$250,000 worth. Unless it is exceptionally seasonable from now on, the crop for the coming year will not be worth half that amount.

### TROUBLE GETTING COAL.

Strategy Employed by a Philadelphia Man to Obtain Necessary Fuel.

This is a true story of how a West Philadelphia man got a load of coal, reports the Philadelphia Record. He wasn't known personally to the dealer, and when he learned that several of the drivers were ill he dressed up in his oldest clothes and went to apply for a job. "I guess I can put you on for several days, but I can't promise you steady work," said the coal man. This arrangement was perfectly satisfactory to the applicant, and pretty soon he was sent out to deliver a load of coal. Instead of taking it to its proper destination he drove to his own home and dumped it into his cellar. Then he took the wagon back to the yards, handed over the price of the coal to the astonished dealer, and made a clean breast of the whole affair. ### RALEIGH'S BURIAL PLACE.

Remains of the Gallant Courier Claimed to Be in Possession of Three Churches.

The question of Sir Walter Raleigh's burial place has lately been revived in England. Three churches claim both the head and body of the gallant courier, says the New York Tribune. Immediately after execution, which took place in Tothill street, Westminster, on April 29, 1618, his wife placed the head in a red bag and rode off with it in a mourning coach. This treasure she kept for 25 years. The body was buried in St. Margaret's church, but shortly after the execution Lady Raleigh wrote to her brother, Sir Nicholas Carew, asking permission to bury her husband's body in his church at Redding, where she desired also to be buried. History is silent from that time on. It is known, however, that her son treasured the head as his mother had, and, according to the London Daily Chronicle, tradition says it was finally buried with him at West Horsley, Surrey. Dr. Brushfield, who made a thorough study of Raleigh history, is of the belief that when investigation is made the three bodies—either, mother and son—will be found buried together. He has suggested to the British Archaeological society to inscribe the stone under which his body is supposed to be buried in St. Margaret's, London, with his name and coat-of-arms. No English memorial to this "universal genius" exists. The west windows of St. Margaret's, dedicated to his memory through the enterprise of Dr. Farrar, were the gift of this country.
