Tobacco is growing well, but there is much more to be set, especially in the western portion of the State. The acreage is considerably less than usual.

Meadows are generally in fair condition, with the exception of timothy, which generally is poor. Pastures afford good grazing, but are needing rain.

John L. Pond, of Simpson county, sold a nice bunch of grade Angus calves for September delivery at 5 cents. They will average about 1,300 pounds. Mr Pond is about the only man in Simpson county breeding the black cattle.

There is some complaint of apple dropping, and as they were very thin on the trees in many places, this will lower the yield considerably. Peaches are doing well. They are very irregular, some localities reporting a heavy crop and others none at all. Blackberries are quite promising.
