





### Warning to Water Users.

Notwithstanding the continued drouth, the water works lake has held out all right, and now has enough water to run for some time with no rainfall, but in case of a big fire, where the hose would be used for some hours the supply would be so materially reduced as to cause trouble. Therefore, we warn the people to be careful in using water. Don't waste it, under any consideration. See that the children are prohibited from playing with the hose, let that old rattle-trap buggy go without washing for a short time. It is a fact that the water-works in nearly every other town in the State have been compelled to shut up shop, so severe has been the drouth, while in many towns no water is used for sprinkling at all. No rain of any consequence has fallen for six or eight months, the streams have quit running, wells are dry, and springs have ceased to flow. Pastures have dried up, while vegetation and other crops are like tinder. As there is no indication of rain The Record appeals to renters of water plugs to be careful, use judgment, thrash the children who waste the water, and Lancaster will pass over the drouth all right, but, unless this is done, we are certain to get in the same fix as some of our sister cities.
