Mr Louis Fleischman, of New York was a man of many and varied charities, but his benefactions were conferred in his own way and not according to other men's plans and systems. In short he was not "organized;" associated charities knew him not, and professional philanthropists frowned upon him. They said he pauperized the idle. One of Mr Fleischman's business establishments was a large bakery, and ten years ago he began the practice of giving away the loaves left unsold at a certain hour in the evening. Each man was served with half a loaf and, if he cared to wait, a cup of hot coffee went with it. This opportunity swiftly became known, and regularly every night a long line of men, some gaunt and ragged; some fairly well dressed but with the look of want upon them waited patiently for this distribution. Doubtless in this "bread line" were some who were "unworthy;" the organized charity people said so, and said they ought to work for what they ate. Certainly, though no man was there who was not hungry and, whatever scientific charity may say, starvation is not necessarily a result of crime. Even if it were so, the Book which holds the greatest moral law does not forbid the feeding of sinners. At all events, even the sinners who were fed were grateful, and when it became known in that bread line the other day that Mr Fleischman was dead, hats were doffed reverently, there was a husky clearing of throats and many a broken word of sorrow for the loss of one these waifs held to be their friend. He had helped to pauperize them, perhaps, but he had touched their human souls, and who shall say but that he brought them nearer to the great Giver of bread? Can organized charity do as much?
