### City Election.

Edward Bishop was elected Mayor without opposition. The Peoples Ticket, consisting of J. E. Stormes, S. C. Denny, C. D. Powell, J. B. Kinnaird, J. B. Conn and S. G. Haselden, was elected for City Council, by majorities ranging from 71 to 109 votes. D. W. C. Armstrong was elected Police Judge by 92 Majority over his nearest opponent.

### Land Sale.

James Martin of Madison county bought of Zack Eikin 213 acres of land near Marcellus for \$20,000 about \$94 per acre. Jonah Marsee sold 70 acres, near Marksbury, to Pendleton Cobb of Jessamine county, at \$80 per acre, and Jesse Fox sold 200 acres to Joseph Hammond, of Knox county.

We welcome the new owners and hope to hold those who have sold their farms. These and other sales show the demand Garrard county land.

### Competition Makes Rates.

The rates of railways are governed by the same laws that fix the price of other necessities of life. There are no exceptions to the rule. We can no more change them arbitrarily than we can the price of fish and flour. The same principles govern in each case. What may be a reasonable rate in one section of the country may not be in another. The question is purely a local one. It cannot be generalized or made to fit any formula. It is a practical, not a theoretical, question. There is nothing ideal about it.

At the present day it takes experts to make rates. The people want good railroad service, and they ought to have it at fair rates; but to give them this, it is essential that the road be kept in good condition and well equipped; that the trains be sufficiently manned and well handled; that competent men be employed and fairly paid, and that the company avail itself of all new appliances to make the service, more speed, more convenient, or more safe.

Shippers are not ignorant fools. They know there is great competition by railroads, and those who have products to sell generally know what fair shipping rates are.



### County Election.

For sufficient reasons the writer does not use the rooster this time though the entire county ticket was elected by large Democratic majorities. We give the majorities, as we gather them where there was opposition, as follows: Hubble, for Senator, 469; Cochran, for Representative, 442; Ford, for Judge assessor, 424; Bourne, for Magistrate in the first district, 343. The present magistrates were all re-elected. G M Siler was elected constable in first district; William Campbell in Paint Lick district; J W Huffman at Bryantsville, and Raymond Ray, at Buckeye.

Doty, for clerk, Robinson, for county attorney, Arnold for Sheriff, Miss Mittie Dunn, for School Superintendent, and Henry Simpson for coroner, had no opposition but received large votes.

Carpenter, prohibition candidate for Senator, received 62 votes, and Parks, for representative, on same ticket, received 60 votes. A majority, of about 116 votes, was cast in favor of the Constitutional amendment to return to the viva voce system of voting. Although many were disappointed in the results of the election, in the city and county, it is true that we will have an excellent public service.


