#### Profitable Crop.

Curtis Skidmore, of Powell county,  
put five acres in tomatoes; he sold six-  
teen hundred and twelve bushels at 25  
cents per bushel to the cannery, real-  
izing \$39.60 per acre, besides losing a  
bout five hundred bushels by prema-  
ture frost and the vines make his  
ground better each year.

Dr Donald McDonald, well-known  
and highly thought of by many Lan-  
caster people, died at Pittsburg, Pa.,  
last week. He was one of the most  
prominent ministers in the Presby-  
terian church, and was prominently  
identified with the work of that de-  
nomination in the mountains of Ken-  
tucky.

#### Repairing Bridge.

The iron bridge, on New Danville  
pike, is being overhauled and put in  
good shape. It was found that one  
corner of the abutment was unsafe,  
and the sills had become badly decayed  
so the Garrard officials, in conjunc-  
tion with those of Boyle county, em-  
ployed an expert bridge man to inves-  
tigate the structure and the door was  
ordered replaced with new timber.  
Squire Bourne is superintending the  
work. To make these repairs it is nes-  
sary to close bridge to travel, all ve-

river.

Tinder and Rev O P Bush at the Lan-  
caster Cemetery Sunday afternoon.  
The large attendance at the grave  
and the many beautiful floral designs  
bespoke the love and affection of her  
legion of friends, who while deeply  
grieved that she is with them no  
more, have the blessed comfort of  
knowing that she is now with the  
Savior she loved so well and is free  
from all suffering.


