General News.

A Pension appropriation will be \$161,000,000, which is \$2,000,000 less than last year.

If left to the candidates, we believe they would make the necessary expenses very excessive.

Two hundred and forty men were entombed by an explosion in a coal mine in Hungary. Forty-five bodies have been recovered and sixteen survivors rescued.

The law passed for the purpose of fire arms, the idea of the framers of the act being that few people could hide about his person a gun two feet long.

This law might be good enough for Alabama, but as most of the pistols in Kentucky seem to have over regulation issue, we would have to have the law read for three foot guns instead of two.

It will require \$234,000,000 to run the Postal Service during the fiscal year of 1910. This is an increase of \$12,000,000 over last year, and results from increase in salaries, railroad clerks, carriers, and the extension of the rural service.

The Alabama Supreme Court held the John pistol law to be valid. The law provides that no one shall own or carry a pistol or gun less than twenty-four inches in length; also that pistol supplies for guns of less size cannot be sold.

The Grand Army of the Republic desires a national celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Lincoln on February 12, and has asked President Roosevelt to issue a proclamation to the country inviting and urging such a celebration.

Jacob B. Perkins of Cleveland, completed the purchase at Lexington of twenty-four matched black horses, which were shipped to Cleveland to be used by the famous Troop A, or "Black Horse Troop," in the Taft inaugural parade, March 4.

Six Washington newspaper correspondents, including representatives of the New York World and the Indianapolis News, have been summoned before a Federal grand jury in connection with charges concerning the purchase of the Panama Canal.

Senator Tillman made another speech in the Senate, in which he added the names of Attorney General Bonaparte and Postmaster General Meyer as members of President Roosevelt's "Ananias" club. The Senator said he was prepared for anything, even the assassin's knife.

William A. Anderson, a conductor on the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad branch line from Catlettsburg to Pikeville, was robbed and murdered. After Anderson was dead the murderers carried his body out onto a high trestle and bound it to the rails, where it was struck by a freight train shortly afterward and badly mangled.

A bill to regulate campaign contributions was introduced in the Indiana Senate by Senator Mattingly. Corporations, according to the bill, must, if they make contributions, do so in a prescribed manner under penalty of dissolution. Candidates for political office are not to be permitted to spend money except for strictly legitimate purposes. It also provides that liquor dealers are not to be allowed to make any contributions of any sort for political purposes.

Damages in the sum of \$50,000 are asked in a suit filed in the United States Court at Paducah by C. W. Buckner, of Metropolis, Ill., against 210 alleged night riders. The majority of the defendants are residents of Lyon county, and many of them are prominent in Western Kentucky. The plaintiff is Police Judge of Eddyville and he claims the defendants compelled him to walk barefooted to the Cumberland River in his night clothes, where they beat him

unmercifully with clubs. A bill to guarantee bank deposits was introduced in the Indiana State Senate by Senator Grube, of Kosciusko and Marshall counties. National banks are exempt from its provision. The measure provides for a tax of one-half of 1 per cent on the average daily deposits of all banks and trust companies. In order to keep the guarantee fund in a satisfactory condition a special assessment may be levied on the capital stock of banks and trust companies according to the amount of daily deposits.

Alex. Gibbs, sold 20 head of export cattle, weighing 1,300 pounds each, to Simon Well, at Lexington, for 54c per pound.

In the last few days mule buyers have purchased at Union City, Tenn., six carloads of fine mules, paying out \$40,000.

Farmers and their wives in Barren county, Ky., have received between \$25,000 and \$30,000 for their turkeys this winter.

At the sale of Squire J. P. Bourne, corn brought \$3.08 in the crib; mules from \$140 to \$175; cows from \$50 to \$60, sheep \$8.05 per head, hay 40 to 42 cents per hundred.

If you haven't yet plowed the garden try and find some day this winter in which to do the job. It will mean vegetables at least ten days earlier next spring should it happen to prove wet.

Mat S. Cohen sold the famous premium saddle mare, Edna Mae, to Mrs. Richard Lawdies, of Clarkburg, W. Va., for the handsome sum of \$4,000. She was shown at Garrard County Fair last year.

Buyers are searching Kentucky for 150 black horses to be used by the famous cavalry troop of Cleveland, O., which will act as escort to President Taft in the inaugural parade.—Interior Journal.

As soon as freezing weather sets in, cover the strawbery patch with straw to prevent alternate freezing and thawing of the soil and a consequent lifting of the plants. Manure with the straw is good.

Hemp breaking is now in order and the price is six cents. Hemp hands are asking \$1.50 for breaking short hundreds in Fayette county. The crop is of larger acreage in Jessamine this season.—Jessamine Journal.

On account of the racing legislation enacted last year in New York, many thoroughbred horses belonging to J. B. Haggin were sold from his famous Elmendorf Farm, Lexington, Ky., at auction, in Germany, a few days ago.

Thirty-four mares and colts were sold, at a total of \$17,748, an average of about \$500, the highest being \$1,050 for Gold Order. Prince Sandretski, Lieutenant, von Bennington, and other famous turfmen were among the purchasers.

The most important sale of prize winning jacks ever recorded in Kentucky was closed yesterday when Mr. S. C. Nunnelly, proprietor of the breeding establishment for jacks and saddle horses of Greendale, parted ownership with that grand prize winning jack, General Woods, for \$2,500. The Doctor, \$1,000, and Kentucky Mammoth, \$1,000, to Mr. Ed Thompson, an extensive breeder of jacks and saddle horses of Grundy county, Mo.

In the sale of General Woods, Kentucky loses one of the grandest jacks ever bred within the borders of the Blue Grass and one that has established an enviable reputation in the show rings of several States, being the winner of fifty-eight blue and sweepstakes, also the winner of the United States Championship Cups at the Nashville, Tenn., State Fair in 1907 over 137 of the finest jacks in the country.

W. B. Burton shipped a car load of mares and horses, Monday, to Wilson Live Stock Co., Wilson North Carolina. The car was composed of 20 mules, which cost him \$3,900 and 5 horses, costing him \$800. He also bought of J. B. Ruble, Buena Vista, nice team of mare mules, for \$400 and of Duckworth and Benton, Nicholasville, Ky., 5 mules for \$165, per head.

The registration of an animal in a public stock register should be held sacred by all breeders, and false registration should be severely condemned and the extreme penalty given to anyone thus violating the law. A member of any association who is found guilty of uttering a false pedigree should be expelled from membership in addition to a public criminal for the results of his crime are far reaching.
