Crab Orchard Springs May be Sold.

A deal is on foot among a number of well-knowing Harrodsburg capitalists to organize a stock company whereby it is proposed to purchase the celebrated Crab Orchard Springs and make it one of the largest health resorts in the South. An option has been obtained on the springs and hotel property for \$33,000, and it is more than likely that it will be taken over before the expiration of the ninety days allowed by the present owners.

Those interested in the deal are Col. D. L. Moore, Judge John W. Hughes, W. J. Poteet, of Harrodsburg. They propose to expend \$50,000, in improvements on the property and organize a company with a capitalization of \$100,000.

Crab Orchard is one of the oldest and most famous health resorts in this country and should this deal go through, it will mean that many more people will spend some of their time at this splendid place.

Trustee and the School.

When the general education of the masses is accomplished, it will be done through the public schools of the state. This is a condition so much desired, that we feel justified in calling public attention to any thing that will aid in bringing it about.

The success of the district school does not depend alone upon the teacher. There must be a co-operation of the teacher, trustee and parentage, with an ambitious pupilage. The burial took place in the Danville Cemetery at two o'clock Tuesday afternoon, services conducted at the grave by the Rev. Josiah Godbey, pastor of the Methodist church at Burgin. Dr. Swope is survived by four children, his wife having died several years ago, the children are E. K. Swope, W. H. Swope, and B. P. Swope, of Bryantsville and Mrs. George Bagdale, of Pleasant Hill.

Hid in River Cliffs.

John Grimes, who lives in this county in the Bryantsville neighborhood is at large in the Kentucky river cliffs and is being hunted by a gang of men from Mercer and by the sheriff and his deputies of this county. On last Thursday Grimes attempted to assault little Mary Ashford who lives near Munday's Landing in Mercer county. The little girl's screams attracted the attention of a negro who gave the alarm and had Grimes arrested. Authorities from Mercer county started to Lexington with him to land him in jail there but Grimes leaped from the window of a moving train near High Bridge and since has been in hiding in the cliffs of the Kentucky river. He was last seen by a posse from the Munday's Landing section Monday. They saw him in the Buena Vista section crawling along in some shrubbery and fired several times at him but haven't been able as yet to catch him. It is believed that he will be lynched if caught while the excitement is at such high pitch, however we hope that this will not happen and that Grimes will be caught and let the law handle him, which will be as severe as the mob.

Game of Craps Ends in Killing.

James Ross, who has been running a little grocery store near Hammock in this County was shot twice with a pistol by Quince Tankersly at the store of Ross last Sunday morning about three o'clock. Dr. William Burnett was telephoned for immediately and brought the wounded man in his automobile to the new hospital in Lancaster, where an operation was made Sunday morning. Ross was hit twice, one shot taking effect in the left arm about the elbow, and the other in the right side penetrating the liver and the stomach. Ross died from the effects of the wounds Monday morning about five o'clock, and was buried Tuesday.

Both the deceased man and Tankersly were born and reared in Garrard County and were neighbors, each being about thirty years of age. Ross was a son of the late David G. Ross and is survived by a wife and mother. He had the reputation of being a peaceable and quiet young man and had many friends in the neighborhood where he was raised.

Reports as to the shooting are conflicting but from the best information obtainable, the accused man and deceased with some others had been engaged in a game of craps on Saturday night, which had lasted up to a short while before the shooting. Tankersly had been drinking, and when considerably under the influence of liquor a quarrel arose and he drew his pistol and fired three shots two of which took effect in the body of Ross. It is reported that when Tankersly shot, Ross had his hands up asking him not to shoot.

To a representative of the Record, the accused man stated that he did not intend to shoot Ross but was shooting at another person, who was shooting at him at the time and that the shooting of Ross was unintentional, and that Ross was his friend Tankersly was arrested by Sheriff Ballard, Sunday morning and landed in jail.

On Monday morning he was brought before County Judge and his examining trial set for next Tuesday.
