We desire to say a few words especially to the farmers, and incidentally to every citizen of the county who is interested in the marketing of home products at home; there is now a movement on foot to establish a loose leaf tobacco market in Lancaster just how bad this is needed it is useless to try to impress on anyone, for it is a well known fact to every grower in the county that Garrard county is but

a feeder for surrounding towns who have these markets.
The promoters of the scheme have in mind the Pilgrimage Distillery property, which is admirably adapted to the proposed use, and which may be purchased at a reasonable figure; this property cost originally \$25,000; there are upon the grounds several commodious buildings, one of which is brick, there is ample room, a splendid lake of water, a switch connecting the property with the L & N railroad, in fact many of the advantages which are absolutely necessary to a loose leaf market are already there; it would take a comparatively small amount to place the property in condition for conducting sales, and improvements could be made from year to year as the requirement of the business demanded. However, the promoters of the scheme are not wedded to this or any other piece of property, their intention is to inaugurate a loose leaf tobacco market, not to dispose of any certain piece of property, and after the final details are arranged, the stockholders may purchase any property they may deem most advisable. The stock is being taken very liberally in blocks of from \$100. to \$500. and the more generally it is distributed throughout the county, the better it will be for the ultimate success of the enterprise. That a loose leaf market pays well those who invest their money in it, has been thoroughly demonstrated in surrounding towns, and people here who have made a study of the matter are ready to admit that the investment would prove profitable.

A question which is asked by almost everyone who is approached on the subject is "can we get the buyers", for answer we will say that this phase of the question will be thoroughly investigated before anything definite is done in the matter, but we give it as our opinion that 5,000,000 pounds of the best tobacco produced in the world will never want for buyers.

We have facts and figures from one of the most correct statisticians in the county, one who has made a close study of this question, showing that the cost of transporting the county's crop to adjoining markets, the cost of handling it, extra teams and other expenses incident to the journey costs the growers of the county \$22,500. annually. All this money goes out of the county, to say nothing of the money which is spent for merchandise by those who accompany their crops to market. Another disadvantage to the marketing away from home is the long and tedious journey which it necessitates and the accompanying inconveniences and danger to the health. We would be glad to publish the data which we have in the premises, but space will not permit it. In view of these facts, it appears to us that a home market is not only to be desired, but is an absolute necessity, and that the merchants of the county could find no better investment than in the stock of the proposed house, that it is as much to their interest to have a home market for home products as it is to the interest of the producers.

There has been for some time a current of feeling among the farmers of the county for a loose leaf market, several of them have expressed themselves as favoring it, but there has been until now no concerted action in the matter, and now that the matter is being placed in some tangible shape, is being offered to them for their approval and support, we believe that they will take hold of it readily, and that by the time another crop of Garrard county tobacco is ready to be placed on the market that an up-to-date loose leaf warehouse will be in operation and ready to accept and handle it.

Farra Mentioned For Delegate To National Convention.

The Louisville correspondent of the Louisville Times says: Representative John M. Farra, of Garrard, and former Senator W. W. Booles, of Spencer, are being strongly tipped for delegates from the Eighth Congressional district to the Democratic National Convention at Baltimore in June next. They reside at extreme ends of the district and are located geographically to command strong support. Col. Robert G. Evans, of Danville, one of the best-known Democrats in the Eighth, is also an avowed aspirant for the honor of being a district delegate to the Baltimore convention. The genial Colonel has a knack of usually getting what he goes after and it would not be unwise to have a "ticket on him."

Shocking Tragedy In Stanford.

Late last Sunday afternoon screams of a woman were heard at the home of Anderson Carr a well known colored man in Stanford, and about ten o'clock Sunday night Carr went to the home of county Judge Bailey and reported that his wife had died, stating to the Judge that she had been suffering with cramps that he was sitting before the fire asleep and that she threw a small mallet at him to awaken him, the blow injuring his head, that he went to a nearby physician to have the wound dressed and when he returned he found his wife across the bed cold in death. Coroner George P. Bright empaneled a jury the following morning and a verdict was rendered charging Carr with the murder of his wife. He was immediately arrested, but requested the officers to accompany him to his store that he might get some valuable papers, while there, under some pretext he managed to get hold of a 45 calibre Colt's revolver, firing a shot into his breast which resulted in his death Monday. Carr was indicted by the Lincoln Circuit Court in connection with the finding of about twenty gallons of whiskey on his premises recently, and he is suspected of being connected with a great deal of the illicit sale of liquor which has been flourishing in Stanford. Carr was well known in Lancaster, having brought several good horses here and sold them. He was thrifty and smart, but was credited with being a very mean negro. His wife was said to be a hard working woman and bore a splendid character.

Roosevelt Club Organized.

Friends of Ex President Roosevelt met at the Court House Saturday afternoon and organized "The Garrard County Roosevelt Club" and selected as a motto "Government of the people, for the people and by the people". Mr. Henley V. Bastin was selected as president and Mr. A. F. Sanders as the secretary of the club. Each of the nine precincts of the county were organized by electing secretaries and steps were taken to thoroughly organize the entire county. About one hundred and twenty five Roosevelt republicans were in attendance and each one was given a Roosevelt badge. After reports were heard from each precinct it was claimed that the organization in Garrard County now numbers more than five hundred. Short speeches were made by several of the local members and much enthusiasm was maintained for the Roosevelt cause. Another meeting of the club will be held at the Court House, Saturday afternoon March 16th, when the local organization will be given the finishing touches.

While the Roosevelt followers were in the Court House the Taft workers were busy upon the streets with all republicans who changed to be in town. Both factions seem to be preparing for a finished fight and from all indications the "fur will fly" among our republican brethren from now until the convention which will be held April 6th.

The meetings in the interest of the Men and Religious Forward Movement have been postponed for one week, full particulars will be sent out later.

On last Sunday afternoon Marshal Herron detained Fred Emerson, better known as "Pottsey" a well known colored character, in the act of selling whiskey and promptly nabbed him, in police court he was fined \$100. for the offense. This negro is an old offender and notwithstanding he has worked out several stiff fines, he will persist in dabbling with the "critter". The alert Marshal has his eye on him constantly and hopes by the administration of such does as the last to break him of his evil ways.
