### When Will It Cease?

A number of our Nimrods are preparing for fall excursions to Cumberland, Rockcastle and Green rivers in pursuit of their favorite sport. However, the depredations of the seiners and dynamiters have devastated this stream to such an extent that it is hardly worth while to think about going to it, and too, it will take years to restock it. It is very much to be hoped that the recent revival of interest in the enforcement of the fish and game laws will cover this stream and will serve to protect it from further ravages.

### Insurance Rates Reduced.

At a meeting of the States Insurance Board in Louisville last week that body decided upon a material reduction in the rates both in the city of Louisville and throughout the state. The report of the commission has not been made yet, but it is understood that it will amount to about 25 per cent on dwellings in towns outside of Louisville. Other risks are to be taken up and it is expected that sweeping reductions will be made on all classes of risks. This is indeed good news to the policy holders who have long felt that their insurance rates were exorbitant and not in keeping with the rates paid on similar risks in other states.
