**The Tobacco Outlook.**  
The tobacco outlook for the coming season, while not as encouraging as we would like, is much better than we had thought it would be at one time. All over the Burley belt there is a shortage in the crop, but plenty of fair to medium tobacco in the Bluegrass section, with a few excellent crops thrown in. In Western Kentucky the drought greatly injured the crop and in that section there will be a great scarcity of low grades, which will put many buyers into the Bluegrass for this class of tobacco.

In this particular section the flyings, trash, lugs and some bright are exceptionally good, but the red and tips are very inferior, being dark and short. Naturally this short and dark leaf will bring down the average considerably. We wish to emphasize the fact that buyers want tobacco that is well cured and well handled and all should put forth their best efforts along this line. It is to be hoped that the crop will bring good prices; if proper care is used in grading and handling.
