POULTRY and EGGS

MOLTING POULTRY. Fowls Need Food Rich in Protein During This Period. Farm poultry molt annually, and the molt in healthy fowls begins in early autumn and continues for about four months.

It will pay any one who keeps poultry to give the most special care and attention during the molting period, writes Ira G. Schellenger in Hoard's Dairyman. The best plan to follow is to begin feeding the fowls liberally on vegetable matter and food rich in protein.



The Langshan came from England, where it has long been popular. In this country it is considered one of the most useful fowls. The hens are excellent layers, and as a table bird the Langshan is excellent. The weights are: Cocks, nine and one-half pounds; cockerels, eight pounds; hens, seven and one-half pounds; pullets, six and one-half. The illustration shows a Langshan cockerel.

Research work concerning the disease has been in progress at the Rockefeller Institute for about six years. Results at first were similar to those in other laboratories, where the virulent agent eluded primary microscopic detection. But the ample means at the command of Dr. Flexner enabled him to pursue the work beyond the stage at which it had blocked other workers.

Infant paralysis is spread in many ways. The common housefly is an active carrier of it. Bees and other carriers have been found which do not themselves suffer from the disease, but which appear to exhale the tiny organisms and thus infect susceptible persons with whom they come in contact.

One part of ointment is mixed with two parts of lard, and a portion about the size of a pea is rubbed on the skin of the hen's body below the vent.

INFANTILE PARALYSIS CURE NEAR, DR. FLEXNER HINTS Reports Finding of Germ of Disease That Makes Cripples. Hope of a cure for infantile paralysis, a disease that has baffled the medical profession for years, is held out by Dr. Simon Flexner, director of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research.

Dr. Flexner explains that through animal experimentation the micro-organism of the disease, heretofore invisible even with the aid of the most powerful microscopes and extremely difficult to grow outside the human body, has finally been grown in test tubes, and is found visible when viewed through the microscope in masses.

TROUBLE AGAIN THREATENED IN MEXICO.

Trouble is again imminent in Mexico. Gen. Villa is up in arms, and is advancing his troops toward the interior with the avowed intention of giving battle to the Carranzites. Villa has announced that he would never accept Gen. Carranza as President of Mexico, either protempore or otherwise, and that peace may be obtained only by the unconditional withdrawal of Carranza from office. Villa also demands an early election, pledging himself not to be a candidate and demanding that Carranza not offer himself.
