### SCHOOL NOTES.

Danville Went Down In Defeat Here Thanksgiving Day, By High School By Score Of 33 to 0.

On last Thursday evening before a large crowd, and ideal weather the Danville boys were defeated by High School by score of 33 to 0. This was one of the best games played, although the score was a little one sided. The Danville squad never gave up hopes, they played good ball, but were out-classed by local team.

The game started with Lancaster receiving the ball, Lancaster after hitting the line and by end runs succeeded in getting the ball to about the middle of the field, when the ball was turned over to Danville for downs but was soon gained back, when end runs by Herron, Bourne and Lawson, and backs by Wilmott, High School succeeded in going over the goal line for 1st touchdown.

Lawson kicking goal making score stand 7 to 0, High School. Danville again kicked off to High School, but not much time was left of this quarter as was Lancaster ball in Danville territory when time was out for 1st quarter.

The second quarter started out with Carrier for High School covering the ball, when forward passes to kick and Tomlinson at ends and end runs, succeeded in making 2nd, touchdown. Lawson kicked goal making score stand 14 to 0, High School. The ball was again kicked off to High School but it first went from one side to the other until time was out for 1st half, with ten minutes intermission.

The 3rd quarter started off with Danville, kicking the ball, and by several end runs and "Bucker" succeeded in going over line for touchdown Lawson, failed to kick goal but missed made score now stand 20 to 0 High School.

4th quarter, started off with ball in High School possession and it looked as if the local team, were out to see how many touchdowns could be made, this quarter however, two times the pig skin was carried over the line for 12 passes with Lawson kicking 1 goal and missing one, making final score stand 33 to 0.

The game was well played by both teams, and the long end runs of Lawson for 30 to 40 yards gains and Herron, Wilmott and G. Bourne were one of the features of the game.

The linemen, consisting of Elmora, Rainey, Rich, Kinnaird, Tomlinson, Montgomery and Carrier stood like stone walls, it was thru their good playing that the game was won. The all-round playing of Veach and Harmon for Danville were stars of players for Danville. Capt Elliott was out of game, together with B. Bourne and Miller, Asst. Capt. Herron very eagerly filled his place.

This game ended the season for contact games between L. H. S. and other teams.
