





STATE GAME AGENT.

Mr. Steve K. Vaught, formerly of Harrodsburg, has been appointed by J. The Turks are commanding the forces on land and the Germans have aircrafts hovering over the operations, protecting the trains of camels, dromedaries and mules that are carrying supplies intended for relief of the Turks in Europe and also for a possible attack upon the English in Egypt.

All preparations have been completed for holding the big democratic rally on tomorrow, Friday. Hon. John M. The Band will be on hand after 10 o'clock and those in charge think they have ample provisions provided to feed the expected crowd. If the weather is favorable this will probably be one of the biggest democratic rallies held in Garrard County in many years.

CHURCH WILL HAVE PICTURE MACHINE.

(Jessamine News.) A contract for the erection of one of the finest country churches in Central Kentucky has been let by the Providence Christian church congregation. The church, which will be located near the site of the present old church, six miles from Nicholasville, will be of pure Doric architecture, constructed of brick with stone trimmings, will have a seating capacity of 800 and will cost \$15,000. The building will be modern in all its appointments and will consist of an auditorium, twelve separate Sunday-school rooms besides the general Sunday school room, parlors, a dining room and kitchen. A pipe organ will be installed. The purpose of the congregation is to make the building one of the best in the country and as ideal as possible and to attain this end Sunday-school room is to be so arranged that a motion picture machine may be installed. The memorial names on the windows of the old building will be transferred to the new building, and in all probability the windows of the new building will all be memorial windows. The old building has been sold to Jessamine county to be used as a community school building as soon as the new building is completed, and will probably be remodeled to some extent before being occupied.
