Beckham, who was running for Senator as an advocate of State-wide prohibition.

STRONG CHARGE TO GRAND JURY

JUDGE HARDIN ASKS INQUIRY ALONG MANY LINES.

W. R. COOK NAMED AS FOREMAN.

The March term of the Garrard Circuit Court convened last Monday morning with Judge C. A. Hardin on the bench. Little difficulty was had in impaneling the grand jury and Judge Hardin thanked those summoned for not offering trivial excuses for not serving, and immediately began his instructions to this august body, which held the undivided attention of the jury and the large crowd that had assembled, for over an hour. He first called their attention to the oath that each member had taken and stated that "only good men were wanted as jurymen, because they had the interest of the community at heart and he felt that such men would see that those who were guilty of any infractions of the law would be indicted."

"Saving yourselves, you will diligently inquire into all violations of the law. You will find it difficult to put anything in action that will destroy a friend, but you are no longer acting in the capacity of a friend or neighbor. Following the duty which you have just sworn to do, will be a test of your character and manhood." At this point Judge Hardin was very complimentary of our new Court House and said it was the "result of co-operation and organization and should be a source of pride to every citizen of the county and a joy for years to come."

"You are here as an organized body, to fight crime and to see that the laws of your state are upheld." "Law," he said, "is nothing more than the will of the people expressed in legislation." Before the present outbreak of the European war, there were ten times as many homicides in the United States as there was in any other country, which was the result of social conditions.

Particular stress was laid on the illegal sale of liquor, gambling and houses of ill repute. He told of the evil influences of all these and insisted that each jurymen aim to better these conditions and make it hard for the violator of these laws.

He instructed them to investigate certain charges that had been made by a local minister and if such violations were true, the public should be made aware of the fact and is such was not the case the public was entitled to know it.

Judge Hardin dwelt at some length upon the game laws of the state and said that at one time Kentucky was noted as the "Happy Hunting Ground" and that conditions still existed here that made the propagation of birds and fish the most desirable in any state. He said the state game warden had told him recently a Frankfort that the farmers of Garrard county were doing more and showing more interest in the enforcement of the game laws, than any other county in the state and I ask that each of you investigate any violation of the game law and help these citizens of the county to enforce it. He instructed them to look after the sanitary condition of the city, all public buildings, and report as to the condition of each.

The grand jury after returning two indictments adjourned over from Monday until today.

Commonwealth's Attorney Puryear and County Attorney G. C. Walker are looking well after the law breakers and many of them will be brought to justice during this term.

"Babe" Burnside, our new Circuit Clerk, takes to his job like a duck to a dough pile and his friends predict that his office will be just to his liking. During this term he will have the assistance of Mr. Tom Wherritt, an old wheel horse.

For disturbing public worship, Jesse Breck was given a fine of \$40 the first day of the court. Commonwealth against Sarah Grimes U. S. L. the jury gave her a \$100 fine. Same against Tommie Adams U. S. L. who drew a fine of \$80 and 30 days board with "Uncle Dave". Same against W. H. Compton for selling liquor unlawfully, was given a fine of \$100 each in three cases and 110 days jail sentence. Compton was out on a \$500 bond with Donaldson Jones as security and as defendant has skipped Donaldson will have to come across with the forfeit. The jury is now in the case of Amo Osborne accused of breaking into the store of Sanders Brothers at Coy.

Hon. H. Clay Kauffman came in from Frankfort Monday to look after some important cases in this term of court.
