


DEMOREST CONTEST.

HEARTY WELCOME

Given Knoxville Board Of Commerce Boosters.

Lancaster turned out en masse and gave a royal welcome to the Knoxville Boosters which arrived in our city yesterday morning about 7:45 o'clock. They were met at the train with a monster crowd, the entire school turning out to give them welcome. Headed by a brass band from the University of Tennessee, they marched to the public square, where Hon. G. B. Swinbrod, as President of the Lancaster City Club made a happy speech of welcome. He was followed by Judge H. B. Lindsey, a prominent lawyer of this southern city and a former member of the Chancellor court there. He in turn introduced other speakers, all of whom were loud in their praise at the welcome being accorded them here. The welcome speakers being, Col. Carey F. Spence, ex-postmaster of Knoxville, under President Taft and a Colonel of the 3rd Tenn. Regiment of state guards. The live wire of the delegation and secretary of the Knoxville Board of Trade, was then introduced in the person of Hon. Joe Bowles who made a catchy speech and was very loudly applauded. He was followed by Dr. George R. Stuart, pastor of the M. E. Church South, of Knoxville and a noted evangelist. He was in a happy mood and kept his hearers in an uproar of laughter. Gen. A. F. Sanford, president of the Journal and Tribune company was a very important personage, and is deeply interested in good roads, being the commissioner from Tennessee for the Dixie Highway. He was taken over the Boone Highway and by automobile to Crab Orchard and intimated that the Dixie Highway might eventually come through Lancaster from Richmond and on to Crab Orchard and connect the Boone Way at this point as there was some doubt of the road being built from Mt. Vernon to Berea by next November, the time set for the dedication of the Dixie Highway.

MOTORIST FINALLY CONQUERS HILL.

Over a four-block course, closely guarded by 100 policemen, the famous California Street Hill in San Francisco was negotiated last week for the first time, on high gear. 
