## FAMOUS NOVELIST AND WAR WRITER PASSES SUDDENLY

Richard Harding Davis, author and war correspondent, died at his home in N. Y. last week from heart trouble. He had gone into his library to dictate a telegram to a friend in New York. His wife assumed, when he did not return, that he had seated himself to read and did not visit the library until after midnight. Mr. Davis had been in failing health for some time and had sought quiet at his country place, Cross Roads Farms, under the care of his wife.

Mr. Davis attained great fame as a war correspondent. He acted as correspondent of the New York Times during the Greco-Turkish War and the Spanish-American War, and as correspondent of the New York Herald during the South African War, Russian-Japanese War, Spanish-Cuban revolution, Matos revolution in Venezuela, American occupation of Vera Cruz and represented the Daily Chronicle in the Allied armies in Belgium and France.
