

KENTUCKY ROLLS UP OLD TIME MAJORITY FOR DEMOCRACY

Wilson's Plurality Reaches 26,604 Votes.

President Wilson's majority in Kentucky last Tuesday reached 26,604 votes over Charles E. Hughes, Republican. The total number cast for Wilson being 188,573, Mr. Hughes receiving a total of 161,969 votes. In the races for Congress the Democrats won in every district, save the Tenth and Eleventh and in those districts the majorities were cut down materially. Helm's majority in this district will reach nearly 3,000.

In the Sixth congressional district President Wilson and Representative Arthur B. Rouse received majorities of more than 10,000 over their Republican opponents, while in the Seventh district Representative Cantrill has a majority of over 9,000. In the Ninth district Representative W. J. Fields has a majority of close to 6,000.

The Congressmen carried their districts by the following votes:

First District--A. W. Barkley, Democrat, over G. P. Thomas, Republican, by a majority of 13,757.

Second District--David H. Kicheloe, Democrat, over W. T. Fowler, Republican, by a majority of 3,700.

Third District--E. Y. Thomas, Jr., Democrat, over J. Frank Taylor, Republican, by a majority of 618.

Fourth District--Ben Johnson, Democrat, over John P. Haswell, Republican, by a majority of 3,022.

Fifth District--Swagar Sherley, Democrat, over W. C. Owens, Republican, by a majority of 1,986.

Sixth District--Arthur B. Rouse, Democrat, over J. E. Shepard, Republican, by a majority of 10,815.

Seventh District--J. Campbell Cantrill, Democrat, over W. J. Mandy, Republican, by a majority of 9,483.

Eighth District--Harvey Helm, Democrat, over L. T. Neat, Republican, by a majority of 2,981.

Ninth District--W. J. Fields, Democrat, over A. J. Pennington, Republican, by a majority of 5,434.

Tenth District--John W. Langley, Republican, over Willis Station, Democrat, by a majority of 6,305.

Eleventh District--Caleb Powers, Republican, over S. B. Dismah, Democrat, by a majority of 19,373.



WILSON A WINNER

DRIFT OF LATE RETURNS INCREASE HIS LEAD.

NEARLY ALL DOUBTFUL STATES SHOW STEADY TREND FOR DEMOCRATS.

A telephone message from Democratic headquarters last night late, states, that Chairman McCormick claims that "when the count is finished Wilson will have more than 300 electoral votes." In claiming the re-election of Woodrow Wilson a statement was made from Democratic headquarters, that the President could lose both California and Minnesota and still be elected.

Mr. McCormick claimed the "solid South" with 149, Arizona 3, California 13, Colorado 6, Idaho 4, Maryland 8, Missouri 18, Minnesota 12, Montana 4, North Dakota 5, Nebraska 8, Nevada 3, New Hampshire 4, New Mexico 3, Utah 4, Washington 7 and Wyoming 3. Total 288.

PRESIDENT WOODROW WILSON.

GARRARD COUNTY POLLS HER LARGEST VOTE AND REDUCES REPUBLICAN MAJORITY.

Exactly 3,000 votes were polled in Garrard county last Tuesday which was several hundred more than was ever known here before. The election passed off quietly and the result of the county's vote was announced within thirty minutes after the polls closed. The result gave the Republicans a majority of 254 votes, four years ago this county gave a Republican majority of 311 and eight years ago a majority of 487.

Helm ran practically with the President and he is re-elected to Congress by something like 3,000 majority. The following is the tabulated vote of the county.
