The flag will be 36 inches wide and 54 inches long. The body of the flag will be white with a broad red border, and three broad blue vertical stripes denoting the Third Loan.

Corn will cost approximately \$5.50 per bushel. Those desiring soy beans for either hay or hogging should see the farm agent also, as an order will be made in the near future.

PROFESSOR SNODDY

To Speak Here Saturday Afternoon.

At a patriotic mass meeting to be held at the court house next Saturday afternoon at two o'clock, the services of Professor E. E. Snoddy of Transylvania University, has been engaged to address the citizens of the county at this time.

Everybody who has a drop of patriotic blood coursing through his veins should make every sacrifice necessary in order to attend this important meeting. Several local speakers will make short addresses. The merchants of the city will be asked to close their stores from two until three o'clock in order to hear Prof. Snoddy whom his friends predict will give us one of the most patriotic addresses ever heard here since the outbreak of the great war, which began one year ago from Saturday April 6th.

FISCAL COURT

Now In Regular Session. April Term.

The regular April term of the Garrard county Fiscal Court has been in session since last Tuesday morning. Most of the first day was taken in passing on and allowing various claims.

The levy of the county will remain as has been for the past five years, the court decided. The court also decided not to apply for "State Aid" money this year toward working the pikes, but will use the money, where in the judgment of the court, the roads are most needed.

The appointment of Dr. Printus Walker, as Live Stock Inspector for the county, was a popular appointment. Dr. Walker will return from Cincinnati the last of the month and assume his new duties.

By the unanimous vote of the entire court, Mr. W. H. Rogers was re-appointed County Agent for another year at the same salary. The unanimous decision to retain Mr. Rogers, meets with the approval of the farmers of the county generally, and speaks well of the work accomplished by Mr. Rogers during his one year service in the county. The fruits of his labors will reflect even greater accomplishments as the years pass.

FAREWELL RECEPTION

Given Colored Boys Before Leaving For Camp.

Should anyone doubt the patriotism of the colored people of this county, that doubt would have been removed had they attended the farewell reception given the boys upon their departure for Camp Zachary Taylor last Friday afternoon. An interesting program had been arranged by the colored friends of the boys and the court house was packed to hear the addresses and the musical program which was rendered, was patriotically and enthusiastically received.

Will Harris acted as chairman of the meeting and introduced the following speakers: J. J. Green, A. W. Jackson and Mesdames Mat Beazley, Mary Leavelle and Callie Duncan, the latter presenting the boys with comfort bags. Judge C. A. Hardin and Judge L. L. Walker, and Rev. J. R. Moorman also addressed the meeting. A lunch was served the boys at the Benevolence Hall before they left on the two o'clock train.

There were thirty one of the boys and their names were given in the last issue of the Record.

The song recently composed by Milton Snead, entitled, "The Boys From Old Kentucky" was sung and received hearty applause.

Altogether the meeting was the most enthusiastic and patriotic one held here since the call of our boys to arms.

POTATO WEEK.

In order to judiciously administer the food of our state it has been decided to designate the week beginning April 7, as Potato Week for Kentucky.

A strict account is being kept of our food supply, and whereas some foods are distressingly short other foods are abundant. There is such a quantity of potatoes left on hand in Ky, that unless the supply is immediately used the farmers will plant sparingly this spring.

We are asked to help in administering the Food of the county by eating potatoes three times a day during Potato week. Use these potatoes during this week in place of foods that have to be transported from other states, and also use them as substitute for wheat, which is so lamentably scarce.

Instead of necessitating the labor and fuel used in making the potatoes into flour and the flour into bread use your potatoes as a substitute for bread.

Set the example by using potatoes every meal the week of April 7th, and influence every housekeeper to do the same. Your help is needed to win the war. Eat Potatoes every meal the week of April 7th, and save wheat flour.

To make definite the amount of wheat products that can legitimately be used by each person if the wheat we have is to last until our next harvest, it is asked that householders adopt as a maximum ration of wheat flour (or its equivalent contained in such wheat products as victory bread, macaroni, wheat breakfast cereals, etc) one and one-half pounds of wheat flour per person, or six pounds per month per person. Continued observance of

wheatless days and meals will aid householders in meeting this new requirement, but in view of this ration we will not hold that wheatless days and meals are obligatory in households.
