R. Hume, 11th Field Artillery, United States army. Capt. Hume returned several weeks ago from fourteen months service in France and is an instructor in field artillery at Camp Jackson, Columbia, S. C.  
Richmond sends the following telegram to the Courier-Journal:  
"Robert Edgar Turley, 26 years of age, has risen from private life to the rank of Major in two years. A telegram has just been received announcing that he has been promoted to the rank of Major in the Coast Artillery. Maj. Turley took his examination at Jefferson Barracks, St. Louis, in September, 1916, and received a commission as Second Lieutenant. After a brief course at Fortress Monroe, in the O. T. C., he was advanced to the First Lieutenant and sent to Fort Adams, R. I., where he remained several months in the Coast Artillery service. Here he was promoted to the captaincy. Last spring he was transferred back to Fortress Monroe as an instructor in the Officers' Training School.  
Major Turley is the oldest son of R. E. Turley, president of the Richmond-Chamber of Commerce, and cashier of the State Bank and Trust Company. He was married last July 4, to Miss Lydia Elmore, daughter of J. W. Elmore, cashier of the Garrard Bank and Trust Co., at Lancaster. Major Turley and Mrs. Turley reside at Fortress Monroe.  
Major Turley was educated in the Richmond city schools, in the Eastern Kentucky State Normal School and the University of Illinois, in the latter of which he completed his civil engineering course, which was the basis of his entrance into the Coast Artillery Service."
