WASHINGTON LETTER.

[From Our Special Correspondent.]
WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 6, 1878.

The approach of the time for Congress to meet brings to mind the subjects that will be early on the docket for consideration. Whether the financial question will occupy much attention depends upon the success or otherwise of Secretary Sherman's measures for resumption. He is very confident that resumption will take place at the time appointed, while there are others, even among those who desire it, who are doubtful upon that point. The estimates for appropriations will form the subjects of early action, but it is not likely that the various bills will be out of Committee till some time after the holidays, and therefore can not take much of the time of debaters in either House until near the end of the session in March. The prospect is that the estimates will be much below those of previous years, and that even those will be reduced by Congress. There will be a struggle between the two parties for the championship in the line of economy.

There is one subject which may or may not come up very early, according to the caprice or the justice of the British Government. That is the question of paying the Halifax award of \$5,500,000 unconditionally. It will be recalled that Congress authorized its payment, under an implied protest. But Secretary Everts wisely informed the British Government that while he was ready to comply with the terms of the treaty, the other party should give assurances equally fraternal. The doubtful point is the failure of Great Britain to apologize or offer recompense for the outrage upon our fishermen in Canadian waters last winter. What Secretary Everts and the people of this country want to know is, if we pay over this money that we are paying for undisturbed rights under the treaty. The sum demanded is exorbitant at best, and it is an outrage to suppose that we should submit to it—the demand, and be driven off the fishing grounds at the will of local mobs. It would not surprise me if Congress gave some pretty decided opinion upon this subject.

Among the subjects that were carried over from last session was the bill for giving a limited aid to the Texas and Pacific railroad, which comes up by assignment on the first Wednesday in the session. The bill provides for guaranteeing the interest only on a limited amount of the bonds of the Company used for construction, and for this guarantee the Company is to give the Government a first mortgage on all its property; to do all the Government's transportation business on trust, which would amount to more than half the interest, to pay over the net earnings of the road to satisfy the interest, and to return to the Government its land grant of 18,000,000 acres to be sold for the same purpose. An incentive to this measure is the recent action of the Central Pacific railroad in refusing to submit to the requirements of the law, and the fact that it oppresses transcontinental trade almost to death by its exactions. Competition would break down this ring monopoly, and therefore Congress will be asked to take early action in the interest of trade as well as of the Government. It is a fact that the Texas and Pacific railway would open up a very rich mining and agricultural section. Washington begins to "spruce up" for the winter business. It has been said that this is a city only six months in the year, and that when Congress is away it is simply a resort for night-seers and pensioners. But every year it is improving, and it is now one of the most beautiful of all our cities. With these improvements comes a stable population, which gives it a more solid air than formerly, and as a city of private enterprise it is not far behind many of those who boast to a far greater extent.




