Circuit Court Notes. The spring term of the circuit court began Monday at Hardinsburg, Judge T. R. McBeath presiding. Hon. W. R. Haynes, commonwealth's attorney, has not yet in appearance, but is expected at Memphis on business. The court appointed Mr. Chapeze Wathen, a rising young attorney of Meade county, attorney pro tem. The grand jury was impaneled and charged by the judge. Grand jurors are all the foremen. Notwithstanding it was a most unfavorable day, it being cold, with intermittent attempts at rain and snow, and the miserable condition of all the roads leading to town, the place was full of people representing all sections of the county. As usual, they came to court to see each other, swap horses, show their fine stock, transact business, and smile on (and with) each other.

Dr. Geo. H. Kutz, of Webster, was here with several of his fine Norman horses, which attract of large crowds on the streets. The docket for this term shows up less litigation than for many years past, there being but fifty-five cases in all. The usual number is from seventy-five to eighty.

The visiting attorneys are Messrs. David W. Fairleigh and Chapeze Wathen, of Brandenburg; Allen Dean, of Owensboro; W. W. Helm, of Louisville; Hon. J. A. Murray and Judge J. C. Babbage, of Cloverport; Hon. Life Green, of Grayson, is also here. Mr. Fairleigh is acting as deputy circuit clerk.

Candidates for the legislature are beginning to show up, three gentlemen having announced themselves to-day. Hon. Jones Wilson was an independent, Dr. Rice Pennington (of Big Spring) and Hon. Wm. E. Minor (of Holt's Bottom). The latter two refer their candidacy to the decision of a democratic convention. Between these two we expect a lively canvass and a red-hot race for the nomination. Hon. G. W. Beashear, our late representative, says he will not offer for re-election. The republicans say they will enter the field later with a "strong horse." Mr. G. P. Jolly will doubtless be the rider.

English Farm Pupils.

Much interest seems to be manifested by our farmers in the system of Messrs. Ford, Rathbone & Ward, of London, for the introduction of farm pupils. Judge J. A. Murray, who represents the society here, has forwarded to London a number of applications, and he expects in a short time to receive the young men, and place them at their homes.

The bonus paid to the farmer (\$120) for his care and instruction to the pupil, relieves him of any pecuniary burden, and, in addition to this, it invites among us the very best of the English population. Every pupil expects to make his home and soon to become a land owner and a permanent citizen, and the parent of the young man through the society, provides for him a home, where he will be properly cared for during a short probationary stage. The ordinary equipment, which he receives on shore, is, in fact, but under this system he has a home provided for him in the strange land before he sails from England. During this stage, he learns our customs, and becomes acquainted with his new neighbors, his friend and adviser in the farmer, and the agent, and is infinitely better prepared to care for himself after the first year.
