The Grand Duke and Duchess of Hesse have separated. Hon. B. K. Bruce, register of the treasury, is seriously ill.

A large number of bogus silver dollars in circulation in Denver. John Daly was acquitted of the murder of Lula Folles in St. Louis.

In London it is considered that war between the United States and Spain is inevitable. Placards have been posted in Madrid urging the election of the Weylerite candidates.

Mrs. A. Platt of Detroit, sister of Secretary of War Alger, died at Norwich, Mont. Dr. Trumbull Cleveland of New York is charged with manslaughter because of his patients died.

Twenty miles of railroad track will be elevated in Chicago this summer. The spring breaking up of the logging camps of the Menominee has taken place.

The Republicans of Kansas City have renominated Mayor James M. Jones. It is denied in Washington that the Alaskan boundary treaty has been signed.

Death of Rev. Samuel Wesley Basham, a Pioneer Minister of the Christian church and a Breckenridge County Man. Caneyville, Ky., March 10.—The Rev. Samuel Wesley Basham, one of the oldest and best known ministers of the Christian church in Western Kentucky, died here to-day at the residence of his son, Prof. W. H. Basham.

He was about ninety years of age and was here on a visit and had been confined to his room but a few days. He was a convert of Alexander Campbell. Immediately after embracing that faith he became active work and was one of the pioneer preachers of that denomination in this and adjoining counties.

He was married twice. His first wife was Miss Young, who was a near relation of Jefferson Daynes, of the Southern Confederacy. His second wife and ten children survive him, among whom are the Hon. J. A. Basham, of Laramie county and Prof. W. H. Basham, of this place.

He was born in Breckenridge county, this State, and came from a very long-lived family of people. He remains will be taken to his home at Big Reedy, Ky., to-morrow for interment.
